



# National Secondary Schools' Kapa

After three long and hard months of practice; cutting into Thursdays and sometimes Tuesday lunchtimes, cutting into our Term 1 Holidays and filling up our weekends with Wananga, our 9 hour trip to Wellington really paid off!

Coming in the Top 10 in New Zealand for Secondary Schools as first time performers was very breath-taking and exciting for us, our tutors and our whole whanau. It was a huge surprise for all of us – but all in all well deserved.

From practising up to ridiculous hours at night, to Papahoronuku and press-ups, we realised how hard it was to fit what should be six months of preparation into three!

With our four roopu - "S.U.P.E.R", "Knock you out!", "We are the Chipmunks" and "Spirit Fingers" skits was a very memorable night; from the Spirit Fingers interpretation of Michael Jackson's 'Thriller' to Knock You Out's boys-turned-ladies (Aubrey, Jade and Jordan Tukere) ensemble!

Waking up early on the Monday morning and heading to the Marae was heart pounding; for us – a step closer to getting on that stage!

We packed our bags in the bus and headed to Mahinarangi for Karakia with Koro Motu and some other Kuia and Kaumatua before we left. Tears, hugs and kisses from all our whanau as we all slowly filled up the bus – they were all so very proud of us – and we were finally on the road!

The trip to Wellington was long; we had a flash "Luxury Travel" bus and to get rid of the boredom we had integrated TVs and, of course, our munchies! All the way there we watched Nacho Libre, Grease and a few Kapa Haka dvds as well.

We arrived at Silverstream Retreat and it looked really scary! We shared the whole Retreat Centre with Hamilton Boys and Girls High School whose tutors are whanau to ours.

The building we stayed in was Stonewall Lodge. Apparently it was an old Mental Hospital and an old Old People's Home. One of the buildings even said "Blood Pressure Unit"! Pretty freaky if you ask me!

From late nights laughing and buzzing out that we would be performing real soon to waking up ridiculously early (between 4:30am and 5:30am!) preparation for our stand was getting more and more heart pounding.

The Powhiri on Tuesday morning was FREEZING! But thanks to our new "slick"

number one uniform, the cold wasn't as bad as it really felt. Our new uniform consists of white blouse/dress shirt, black skirt/pants, the green woollen school jersey, a black tie (optional) and our new black school blazers! Looked pretty fancy too.

Once the powhiri had finished we headed back to Silverstream for a few hours rest then returned to the TSB Bank Arena to tautoko our whanau Hamilton Boys and Girls High School.



As Tuesday's programme came to an end, we headed back home once again to do one final practice before getting on that stage! Just sitting on the bus on the way home made me feel more and more excited! It was less than 12 hours until we were up and getting ready for 'D Day'!

Wednesday. Waking up at 5:30am we were all so excited! Showers were running, power plugs filled with hair straightners and make up was everywhere! Getting ready for the performance was in a way, fun, but also nerve wracking! We all looked so beautiful and handsome once we were ready.

Before we jumped on the bus we formed a circle and sung through a few songs and did our breathing exercises.

Before we knew it, an hour later we were in the holding bay doing touch ups and putting on our korowai! Twenty minutes 'til stage time!

One of the crew members called us in to go to the final holding bay – Kaitataki lead the roopu through. I thought we were going straight on stage!

We got to the last holding bay before going on stage and had one last korero with our tutors. We were already buzzing by then and I nearly wanted to cry – but I couldn't otherwise my mascara would run!

Five minutes was up and Jordan, Rahuri and I were standing on stage as the Kaitataki for the roopu. We could see our whanau standing in the crowd waving their hands up high proudly. The feeling that we felt performing on that stage was unbelieveable – we spoke about it a lot during our hui at wananga, but not many people knew what we were talking about - until we got on that stage. And we pulled out our all, and gave it our best!

No words can express the way we all felt that day. Best way to know was when we were off stage – tears, smiles, laughs and most importantly NO REGRETS!

The trip to the pools was fun – a release after our performance! There was a River Ride – a little part of the pool that had a strong current; and a wave pool – which we don't have at the Ngaruawahia Town Pools.

A few of the kids decided to sneak off to BK for a kai before we went home – Whaea Roa ended up coming too!

On the way home, the people that stayed behind thought they'd try and scare us! Well, it worked for Ruki anyway.

The second group to arrive home knew what was happening and had a plan – we used our drinks as backfire. As we opened the door of Stonewall Lodge they all bounced up and we got our drinks and just threw them in the air! It was hillarious because they thought we didn't know – and they were all wet! Fast forwarding to Prize-giving – another heart pounding time for all of us. Coming in the Top 10 was a major success for us as first time performers at Secondary School Nationals. 

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
