Maori Students Academic Achievement Hui



This is the third hui held over the last three years where the school has deliberately wanted to link with whanau in overcoming fundamental barriers to Maori student academic achievement.

The emphasis in the past has focused on where things go wrong. This year, following a very successful whanau hui in October 2008, has seen us change the direction of focus to target “what will actually impact our students and support the raising of academic performance at Ngaruawahia High School.

The endeavour of the Maori student Academic Achievement committee is to raise the levels of performance. To this end we have set a school-wide goal of an 80% Maori student pass rate at NCEA Level 1 in 2011.

This will be built up over time beginning with –

2009 60% Maori student pass rate at NCEA Level 1

2010 70% Maori student pass rate at NCEA Level 1

2011 80% Maori student pass rate at NCEA Level 1

This is no easy task!!! To do this we need the support and cooperation of all stakeholders in our students, and especially we need our students on board.

2007 44.5% Maori student pass rate.

2008 38.5% Maori student pass rate.

Even though we had some quality passes, we had a significant number who did not make the grade. Why???

This is the question we want to answer as a school. We, that is, the Maori student Academic Achievement committee, Te Kotahitanga, Senior Managers, Heads of Departments, Literacy Focus Group, classroom teachers, and whanau are working together to develop strategies to combat this systemic failure.

How, you might ask? We believe the fundamental key to improving academic achievement lies primarily in language – that is literacy skills. This is going to be the key focus for all of us. To this end all the groups above, under the guidance of the Literacy Focus Group, are going to begin by putting together a “Home Literacy Support” package.

This was one of the outcomes of the hui held this term. What can parents/whanau at home do to support their children in their learning?

It is therefore our intention to offer support to the home while continuing to carry out school-wide literacy support systems throughout the school.

It is fortunate that the Education Review Office have just published a package on this very thing in its “Partners in Learning: Schools’ Engagement with Parents, Whanau and Communities.”

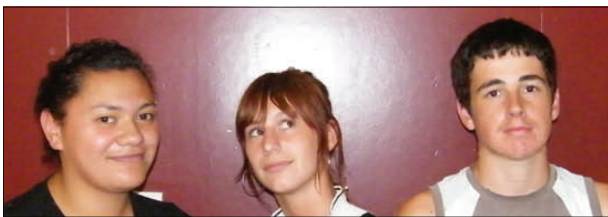
The school extends a heartfelt thank you to those families who attended these whanau hui and would love to encourage more whanau to attend all future hui. We will be holding a further hui in October to share evidence of the efforts we are embarking upon as a school.

Anne & Sarah-Michelle attain Excellence status

The NZQA (our qualifications authority) changed the levels of achievement at Level 1, Level 2, and Level 3 to Achievement with Merit and Achievement with Excellence, as an endorsement of students who gain a significant number of Merit and Excellence credits.

To earn an endorsement at Merit and Excellence levels, students must gain a minimum of 50 credits of Merit or 50 credits at excellence. This is not as easy as it looks guys!!

We have in the past had several students who have

passed NCEA Level 1 and 2 with a Merit endorsement, but so far, none at Excellence level, until 2008.

Our school was fortunate enough to have two students earn this privilege – **Sarah-Michelle Washer** and **Anne Roa**.

The girls were asked to share with all of us their “secret recipe” for gaining an endorsement at Excellence, and here is what they said.

Anne (far left) said “I had an incentive to achieve NCEA with Excellence.”

Sarah says “I wanted to prove to myself that I could compete with others from any other school and that I could achieve excellence at this school.”

Advice to up-and-coming Year 11's.....

“Do your Art!!”

“Do all your internals otherwise there'll be too much pressure in the exams”

“Tell your teachers you are aiming high or to excellence because they will help”

“Focus on all your exam subjects, but focus more on those subjects you are confident in”

“Make sure you pass your English credits or Te Reo Maori”

“Make time to study outside of school”

“Take lots of notes”

“Go to all the exam tutorials”

“Take all practice exams seriously”

“Chase up your teachers for your internal assessments”

“An upside to this was putting Ngaruawahia High School on the map”

Sarah-Michelle Washer:

Gained 75 credits at excellence level. 46 of those credits coming from external assessments (exams). These were achieved from a wide range of subjects including: Accounting, Graphic Design, Economics, English, Mathematics, Science, Visual Arts (in fact all of Sarah's subjects).

Anne Roa:

Gained 59 credits at excellence level – 32 of those coming from external assessment. Anne's subjects include, Business Administration, Economics, Mathematics, Science, Visual Art, Level 1 and Level 2 Te Reo Maori.

For those in the times of the old School Certificate this is like having heaps of “A's” – how many of us did that!

These young ladies provide an incentive to all those coming after them, especially this year's Year 11 students. Among them are quite a number of potential endorsements at Excellence, so we are looking forward to increasing the excellence rate.

Additions to the room include a deck area for dining, new gas/electric stoves and up-to-date food preparation areas. A commercial-grade air/fume extraction system has also been fitted.

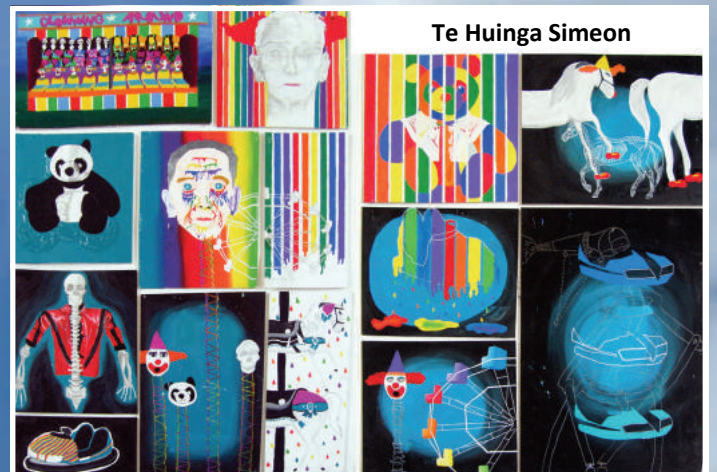
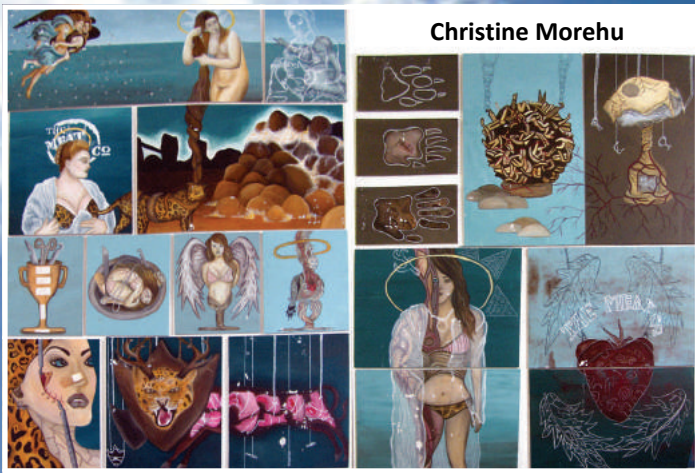

Up against 64 other schools, we are all very proud to come home with a silver and bronze medal.

We stayed at Apumoana Marae in Rotorua, only 5 mins away from Lake Tikitapu (Blue Lake) and we are thankful to have such an awesome marae to have stayed at.

We had our whakatau when we arrived and settled in pretty quickly, setting up beds and virtually straight into homework (which our lovely teachers made sure they provided for us – gee, thanks!).

There were takeaways for tea the first night, and talking about food – our meals were WICKED all week! Tuesday morning 'Team Rangimarie' went to the Powhiri at the lake while the rest of us mentally and physically prepared ourselves for the W12 races for the day.

Some teams got to go to a natural mineral bath 'up the road' which was a good opportunity for teams to gel even more.

Thursday morning was beautiful – although it was cold, we kept warm with our new uniforms and the jackets Whaea Roa gave us.

Our junior teams paddled really well – with three teams making champ finals and the rest

making plate finals or semi's.

Teams were really happy with the efforts on the water on Thursday, however, we all knew we needed to have an early night and start focussing in order

to achieve anything on Friday. We enjoyed dinner at the pools, but had an early night.

Friday morning – D day. Te Ataamira missed out on finals after having the fastest

qualifying time but being

given a 10 second time penalty for missing their turn, however, Rima Eka, Tumanako, Rangatahi, Team Rangimarie, Wahia Nga Rua and Manaaki made a lot of waves on the water knowing they needed to 'nail it' if they wanted to progress to Champ or Plate finals.

Congratulations to our whanau from Nga Taiatea for bringing home four medals and Rakaumanga for keeping us on our toes.

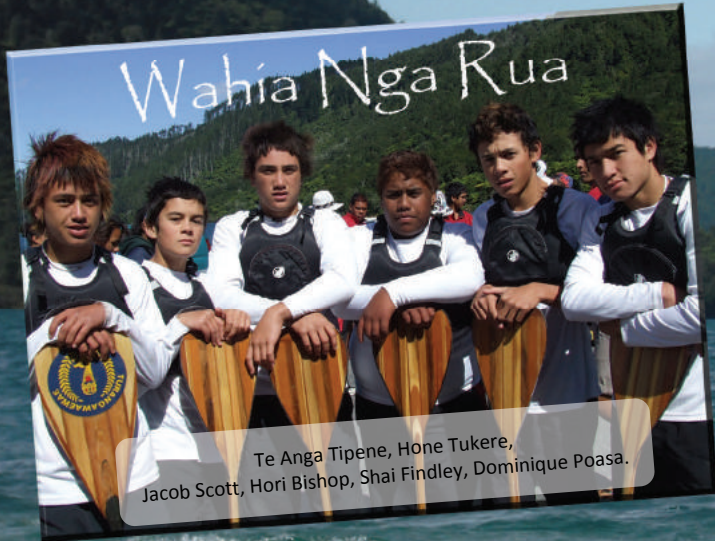

Waka Crews





Turangawaewae Waka Sports (TWS) was first established as Turangawaewae Waka Ama in 2005 under the guidance of Hoturoa Kerr and Te Toki Voyaging Trust.

Participating in both TPOTI (Te Puku o Te Ika Region) regional sprints and national sprints saw an increase in members and a need for TWS to affiliate as an independent club under TPOTI. TWS are now into their 2nd year as an independent club and have currently 167 registered paddlers – of which **Ngaruawahia High School** students make up the majority of our Junior 16 and Junior 19 paddlers.

Ngaruawahia High School are very fortunate to have access to these waka. Although we have two sets of paddles (belonging to the school), they don't cater for the 50+ students that represent our school at the secondary school regionals and nationals held each year in Feb and March. With the support of TWS – we are able to cater for the huge numbers, often

borrowing life-jackets, waka and blades.

We also have a few number of staff who have joined TWS, either in a coaching, managing or paddling position. Whaea Rangimarie is the current secretary of the club as well as a manager for 6 crews. Matua Waki is not only the Chairman for TWS, but also coaches J16's, J19's and Intermediate Girls. Matua Barney is the Midget Girls coach (Kowhai and Awatea – his daughters – both paddle too).

Whaea Reg, Whaea Kahurangi, Whaea Gail (joined last year) and Whaea Tiria have recently joined and now paddle with the ladies of the club. Whaea Sonya's son Morgan is one of our expert intermediate steerers and Matua LeRoy's son has just joined our midget boys.

Our school is reliant on TWS for resources as much as TWS is reliant on Ngaruawahia High School and surrounding schools for people resources.

in order to lead the group. Hinemaia, who sings so beautifully, and Norman who took on a difficult role with such a small number of male participants.

The boys in the Kapa Haka also need to be congratulated on their absolute persistence and resilience, to have not given up when all seemed too much. This is a tribute to you all. This is what rangatiratanga is about – to weave together the group and build solidarity!

We completed our kaupapa with a dinner at The Twin Rivers on Thursday 21 May and with this students presented our Tutors with gifts and an appreciation of the hard work they put in over this time.

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Jared scoops Waikato title

Year 11 student Jared Solomon has been awarded the **Waikato 2009 Swimmer of the Year** title. Jared, 15, qualified for his first national competition at the age of 12 and quickly progressed through the ranks in a sport he wasn't very keen on at first.

"Mum told me I had to do a sport so I started swimming. I didn't enjoy it when I first started but now I really enjoy it," he says.

His natural talent was spotted early and he was told he would go places in his chosen sport.

Jared's name joins many others who have earned the Waikato Swimmer of the Year title over the years, including Olympic swimmers Alison Fitch and Gail Jonson.

But this wasn't the only award he took home - he also scooped the 16 and under 100m freestyle fastest time and open 100m butterfly awards.

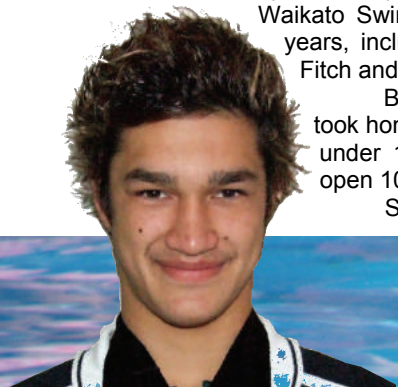
Spending two hours in the pool,

six days a week, Jared now goes to the gym on his rest day as he prepares for his next big race.

Last season was a good one for Jared who experienced success almost every time he jumped into the pool. Breaking Waikato records in backstroke, freestyle and butterfly, he won medals in the New Zealand age group championships, three regional championships, Waikato sprint championships, New Zealand tri-series, College Games and the New Zealand Spring competition.

But what set him apart was his success in the 2008 Pacific School Games in Canberra (Australia). He broke a New Zealand record in the 50m butterfly with a time of 26.67s, was 20 split seconds away from breaking the 100m butterfly and close to breaking the 100m freestyle.

The Waikato award came as a surprise to Jared, who was nominated by his club Ace. "I didn't think I would get it, but it was cool when I went up to accept it," he says.

The show we watched was Matariki themed and we learnt a lot more about this cluster of stars. We then

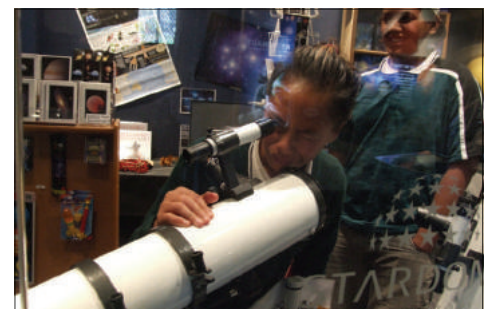
moved into the conference room where we learned about the world spinning, and why there are different seasons and much more.

Reflections

Remit:

• Cater for 50 guests accommodated in two locations on the school campus (serve one group and deliver to the other group)

- Early morning tea at 0845 hours (fresh hot scones, sweet and savoury muffins)
- Morning tea at 11:30 hours (three hot finger-foods, club sandwiches, variety of slices and muffins)
- Lunch at 1330 hours
- Afternoon tea at 1600 hours (variety of muffins and slices).

In the past we have catered for a single function, eg morning tea, afternoon tea, themed dinner table D'Hôte menu, with some success.

This has usually been done with a discreet group of students where relationships have already been developed and strengths and weaknesses identified in the peer group to enable the project to be carried out successfully.

For this function we had a multi-skilled group: three Year 12s, three Year 11s and three Year 10 students.

This arrangement was deliberate, and enabled us to:

- test the Year 12s in their leadership, initiative and problem-solving skills and their ability to deal with contingencies out of their control.
- encourage the Year 11s to develop these skills, and develop their competence in practical tasks
- introduce the Year 10s and all others into a real-life Hospitality environment.

A single function means setting up and clearing up only once. These students dealt with four functions in a one 8-hour shift.

Timing and dealing with contingencies were crucial (none of the functions ran to time; the groups "splintered" and turned up at various venues where they were not expected; the groups, instead of arriving as a group, arrived half-an-hour apart when they were expected to eat as a group).

Student Reflection

I felt that the catering we did for Manu Korero went extremely well. Our team worked really well together and handled the pressure amazingly. I feel that I stepped up to the challenge and coped well.

Being a leader to the Year 10s and Year 11s was quite enjoyable and I not only learned a lot about cooking and leadership, I also learned a lot about time management.

I completely enjoyed the day, from the cutting of slices of meat for the sandwiches to the making of the fish dish (that I had never made before).

This was all a new experience for me that I loved, and cannot wait to do it again.

Screaming voices. Terrified faces. Perfectly visible and then gone.

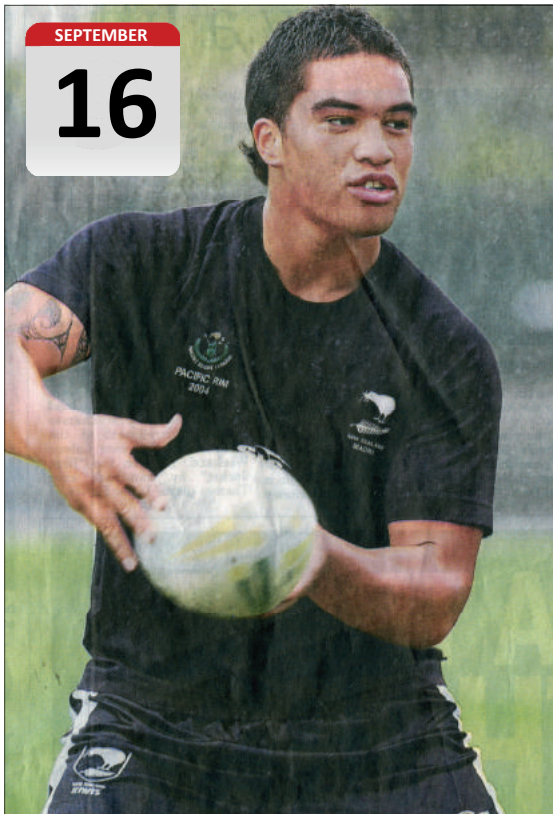
And then I was at the entrance. Four o'clock. My job was done. I walk away.

Iwa Tyson Te Koi is a big Brisbane Broncos fan, but that may change soon when he takes up a scholarship at a Wests Tigers-affiliated school in Australia.

The Year 12 student from Ngaruawahia High School will attend Keebra Park State High School, on the Gold Coast, for the next two years and live the dream of every young rugby league player intent on one day making it into the NRL.

Te Koi, 16, has played league with the Turangawaewae club since he was four and, this year, a stellar season with the Waikato under-16s resulted in him being included in the New Zealand Maori under-16 tournament team and the NZRL Merit 16s selection team.

The 1.91-metre tall, 109-kilogram second rower has played in numerous Waikato age-group teams and his idol is Frank Pritchard.

Te Koi was invited by the Keebra Park school to a one-day trial in Auckland for 240 youngsters and he was one of two boys selected for the scholarship. "I was pretty happy," Iwa said.

Keebra Park school opened in 1973 and is regarded as Queensland's premier rugby league nursery - offering a programme to train the students in areas such as skill development, weight training, diet and nutrition, public speaking, sport psychology and gender/relationships studies, with the

players playing games for the school on weekends.

Even though the Tigers are based in Sydney, their youth identification programme sees them affiliated to Keebra Park. There are other clubs with eyes on the youngsters and the NRL's Toyota Cup under-20s competition now offers a pathway to the top for them.

"You could easily get picked up, there's always scouts at the games," Iwa said.

Notable NRL players who have come through the school include Benji Marshall, Ben Teo, Greg Eastwood, Rangi Chase and Jamahl Lolesi.

Te Koi's major goal is to one day play for the Kiwis and he said the key to getting there would be commitment, family support and hard training.

He heads to the Gold Coast just before Christmas to acclimatise to the heat and the new surroundings before school starts back in January, and currently he is running and swimming so he is in peak condition when he arrives.

His Aunty Bobbin, whom he lives with, has already noticed a difference in attitude.

"He's just been waking up earlier than normal every day. He's just started training hard," she said.

"It's gone from PlayStation and turning up to trainings when he feels like it, to an everyday thing."

Have you heard of this joke? "What do you call a gay man? Anything you want because that poofta ain't gonna do anything about it!" Is that really that funny?

I am here to talk about the progress we've made with Gay Rights, or the progress we think we've made.

Sure, we've come a long way from the day where you were imprisoned for being gay, or killed (by Hitler).

Today, if you are gay, you can even get married - sort of. You can't adopt, but you don't get harassed as much. There are even laws protecting gay rights. But how far have we actually come since the bad old days?

Well, let's have a closer look. You are probably familiar with the following words - faggot, fairy, dyke, bent, queer, poofta; you get my drift, even the word "gay" itself. While it describes a person of a homosexual nature, it is mostly used in a derogatory way.

"That's so gay," meaning it's not so good. As in, if it's gay it's bad. But gay (an don't bother arguing with me) means homosexual. So it's the equivalent of saying gay is bad, a put-down.

Words are extremely powerful ways of putting people down. And gay people definitely suffer from more than their fair share of put-downs. People don't even realize they're doing it. It's time to become more thoughtful and to think before we speak.

Of course, it's not just language that can be used for put-downs. It's how we think about things.

What's your mental image of a faggot? You know, a typical gay guy? Dresses tidily, small build, very effeminate, very creative, probably a hair-dresser or an actor. And a typical lesbian? Big

build, short hair, wears boys' clothes, hairy legs and butch-looking.

Then there are the drag queens in the gold lam'e ball gowns and bouffy wigs, blue eye-shadow and high heels, dancing to "I Will Survive". So, so gay?!

But do we really know who is gay from what they look like? I've given you some stereotypes but most gay people are not like that at all. Most are able to hide, which is lucky, in a world which is so homophobic.

Ten percent of the population is allegedly gay. That's at least two people in this class. But would you know? Not really, because people think of the stereotypes.

But we have to keep coming back to the argument. How far have we actually come with gay rights? We still use derogatory terms for gay people and we still stereotype them. But the worst thing is, it's considered OK to hate homosexuals.

Take the Provocation Law. In recent months this defense has been used at least three times. Once was for that Weatherfield guy who stabbed Sophie Elliot 216 times and then claimed she had provoked him! He went to jail forever.

The other two times you wouldn't have noticed. Both were men who had killed other men, and then claimed justification because their victims were gay. They both got reduced sentences for manslaughter.

How horrible is that! What makes it excusable to kill someone just because they are gay? And for the public to accept that as reasonable is bizarre. It just shows you how far we still have to go.

So, maybe we haven't come as far as we'd like to believe. Sure, we have improved a lot. I like to think people are much more tolerant of people who are gay. And there are laws to protect them now.

But I believe there is still far too much prejudice. Just listen to the way anything bad is called "gay". How many of us accept and laugh at the stereotypes?

And apparently it is perfectly fine to kill someone just because they are gay. What does that tell you about our society? Maybe it's the best it's ever going to be.

I hope not.

Surrounded by family and friends, Ben Gilby-Todd made it home for his 24th birthday on 26th October 2009.

More than 700 people filled Ngaruawahia High School's school hall and outdoor courtyard to celebrate the life of the former Waikato University student killed in a motorcycle accident in Croatia on October 8.

In a touching ceremony, which the family chose to hold at the Ngaruawahia High School because of their connection to the community, tributes and laughter flowed as freely as the tears.

Family friend Sue Saunders read out a tender and touching letter that mother Jan had written to her son after his death.

"Those close to you knew you were special," she read.

She spoke of a "beautiful, easy baby" who took his first steps at Mystery Creek, took a job at a Horotiu panelbeaters at the age of 11, and won a primary school speech contest with a speech about Sir Edmund Hillary, who would become a life-long hero.

She had packed the cue cards for the Sir

Ed speech into her son's suitcase as he left for the United Kingdom.

"I wonder where they are now," she said.

Jan recalled his love of judo, "a particular dent in the dishwasher door as you flung me over your shoulder," and the family's pride at Ben's academic achievements. He gained a Business Management degree at Waikato University as a Hillary Scholar.

"You were so proud to be a Hillary scholar and we were so proud of you."

Ben was also a gifted sportsman, playing representative hockey and winning a New Zealand secondary schools judo belt in 2001.

Jan travelled to London in May, where she met her son, and shared a special memory of them drinking a bottle

of wine in London's Hyde Park, talking about Ben's aspirations and dreams, which included becoming a father.

"However none of your aspirations will be realised," Ms Saunders read. "We are all so very proud of your short life. You'll never be forgotten."

The service was streamed live over the internet so

Jenny Bullivant read a letter from Adam Garside, a young London-based accountant, who was on the holiday in Croatia at the same time as Ben, and spent time with him.

He said that if he had such an impact on his life after only five days, he could not imagine what the impact would be like after losing him for a lifetime.

"You should know that the days leading up to his death were some of the funniest ever," Ms Bullivant read.

Former Ngaruawahia High School principal David Bradford described Ben as the school's model student.

"You could not help liking Ben," he said. "He did more in his short number of years than most of us do in a lifetime. We can see that here today."

Light rain began to fall as soon as Ben's casket was carried out of the hall and through a hockey team guard of honour.

- At the top end we enjoyed great success - the school matched the national average for students achieving NCEA Level 1 with Excellence. Well done girls!
- At NCEA Level we attained just 1.7% below our school target of matching the Decile 1-3 band. We know this is not good enough so the Maori student achievement forum has focused its goal around lifting the achievement levels for Maori students to 60%+, thereby improving overall results
- At NCEA Level 2 – the school attained 79.1% pass rate 1.3% higher than the Decile band. A good result with room for improvement still.
- NCEA Level 3 results were disappointing. Reflective, not of the cohort, but of a lack of suitable Level 3 programmes accessible to all our students. This is an area of concern the school is working hard to change.
- Successful Y9 camp in February – thank you to all staff and Y12 students who led the camp.
- Maori Student Achievement – two hui held this year with the objective of encouraging parents and whanau to support student literacy and overall achievement.
- Participation and success at Waka Ama Nationals 2009.
- School Swimming and athletics sports – enjoyed by all.
- At the NZ national swimming competitions, Jared Solomon collected 1 bronze, 3 silver, and 3 gold medals. For this outstanding performance he was ultimately named the Waikato Swimmer of the year .
- Participation in Tainui Regional Kapa Haka –credit must go

to our tutors, senior students and those new to kapa haka who committed themselves totally to this event

- A fun cross country afternoon – great dress up guys!
- ERO Visit – although usually a nerve-wracking time for staff and Senior Managers, in the end a very successful visit and I must add, testimony to David’s strategic planning and overall leadership skills.We got the big tick!
- Tainui Regional Nga Manu Korero – huge thank you to all staff and students who supported this kaupapa on the schools behalf
- The opening of “Matariki” aptly named for the timing in June to celebrate the Maori New Year – once again thanks go to the Kaumatua of Turangawaewae as always for their support. Agnes and Karen now use the new facilities to help cater to the numerous school events – both large and small
- Y9’s visit to the star dome – an enjoyable time had by all
- Another academic success – Sarah Michelle Washer – Level 2 Accounting submission was completed to such a high standard not only did she maintain her Excellence grade, but her work will be used by NZQA as an exemplar for all L2 Accounting students in the country. Well done Sarah! You are already contributing to Society on our behalf.
- A successful Careers day for our students and contributing schools.
- A successful Y8 Open evening.
- A milestone for the school – Noel Haworth has put in 25 years as the school caretaker – an invaluable and well loved staff member. I know he has had more experience in running this school than I have – nga mihi nui ki a koe Noel.
- Jordan Tukere – 2009 Head Student offered opportunities to trial for West Tigers, New Castle Knights, and St George clubs in the New South Wales Australia Jordan left school early to pursue this new pathway in life – we wish him the best.

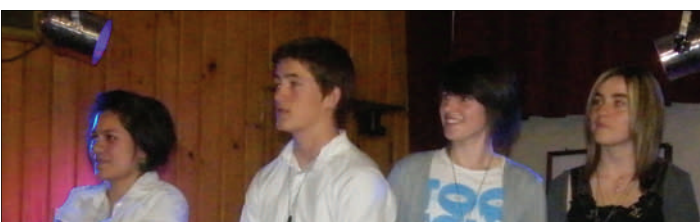
