Ngaruawahia High School Principal's Report to the Community

This year has provided success in many forms. It is my pleasure to share with you our success

Achievement and Success

2011 Student Academic achievements:

- NCEA Level One: The success rate for Males was 78%
- NCEA Level Two: The success rate for Females 85% and for Males 82%
- NCEA Level Three: The success rate for Females 73% and for Males 60%
- NCEA Level Two: Maori students 77%
- NCEA Level Three: Maori students 73%
- NCEA Level Two: Overall success rate of 83.3% (surpassed our schoolwide goal of 80%)
- NCEA Level Three: Overall success rate of 66.7% (surpassed our schoolwide goal of 60%)
- Literacy Reading results measured through the asTTle tool showed a marked improvement for both Year 9 and Y10 students. For Y10 it showed the gap between our students and the national data close significantly

The school continues to offer excellent academic opportunities.

Sports Achievement

- The school increased its range of sports to include cricket and league for the junior school and went some way toward supporting the current sports
- of In-line hockey, Basketball, Netball, and Waka Ama.
- Our staff and students participation in the World's Waka Ama event in August this year was a culmination of years of hard work on the part of
- Waki Simon, Rangimarie Morgan, and Jamie Lichtwark. The event held in Calgary Canada earned students from this school along with their fellow competitors in other local schools the honour of Bronze, Silver and Gold Medals.
- The excessive cost of the Basketball team competing in the Hamilton zone became prohibitive for our students and others schools locally so with great foresight Waki and other Sports Co-ordinators decided to create a competition to involve those of our neighbouring schools at a much more competitive cost to all concerned. This became a very successful event
- Strong collegial relationships with staff and students of the schools around us. We participated with Te Kauwhata College, Huntly College, Te Wharekura o Rakaumanga, Raglan Area School, Nga Taiatea Wharekura. It is these initiatives borne out of a collective and collaborative team that make sports the great training ground for building strong character in our students.
- A junior league tournament was organised at the end of Term 3 and our young men stepped up to take out the trophy for 2nd place. A very proud moment for them and for the school.
- I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Ngaruawahia Panthers Club for their support in managing and coaching our girls' netball teams this year. Their commitment to our school was overwhelming and very much appreciated.

I congratulate the students and staff involved in sport for their dedication and commitment to sport.

Performing Arts

- "Bring it On" dance crew stepped up once again to compete against many larger Auckland Schools. As the only school outside of Auckland in this event it was indeed a pleasure to see our students stand up and be counted amongst the best Auckland had to offer. Although we did not place at the regionals, each student involved put in an extraordinary amount of time, as did their tutor (Chase Nahu-Nikau) and the other lead dancers.
- Kapa Haka 2011 tour to Hawaii in December of 2011 was a real success. Creating opportunities to take expose our students to a s much as possible was the incentive behind this trip. Primarily a language and culture sharing exercise with our Hawaiian brethren our students were able to appreciate both our similarities and our differences. Equally valuable to learn from. We were very proud of our students as they represented the school in an honourable manner.

Well done to the students and staff of 'Bring it On' and Kapa Haka.

Challenges

Our challenges come in many forms, including educational, social, and financial. Some of these are within our control, many fall outside our direct control.

I share with you some of these.

- Standards Alignment a significant leap from student literacy entrance levels to the expected level required to achieve NCEA Levels 1, 2 and 3. A jump of 4 levels in two years.
- Attendance and behaviour the school continues to liaise with families and caregivers to support us in ensuring students are at school willing and ready to learn.
- Encouraging our local community to consider Ngaruawahia High School as a 'viable school of choice.' The Board of Trustees recent community
 survey held in the latter part of this year revealed three significant focus points the school need to address in order to bring about a change in
 school-choice: 1. Student's feeling safe at school 2. Student achievement levels and 3. A wider range of curriculum subjects on offer. These align
 well with our own priorities and affirms the school's endeavour to address these matters.
- Increasing the school roll I take seriously the outcome from community voice and will work with my staff to address these matters. Increasing
 the school roll supports our ability to provide a wider range of subjects and better opportunities for students, and improves our ability to attract
 Ministry funding.

The school faces a number of issues outside its control, mainly in the form of parents and families exercising their choice to obtain a wider variety of opportunities offered outside of Ngaruawahia. Education has become a competitive environment, one we need to be an equal player in. That is our major challenge.

- To move forward utilising our strengths to best advantage
- To offer a robust range of academic and career pathways for our students
- To provide quality learning for all
- To cater to all student educational needs
- To support and promote positive social growth in all our students
- To be a useful community resource


This year, a new basketball competition was started up in the North Waikato area. This gave our basketball teams a chance to play basketball without it costing too much.

No Escape

It is dark, darker than it has ever been within these four walls. This is a place where I should be safe, yet it has become a deep, black vortex that can no longer protect me from this relentless fear. Echoes of shattered glass and screeching voices repeat in my head. I'm a hermit – a prisoner of my own nightmare. There is no longer the option of escape.

Music pounds through the house and doors start to slam, screams grow deeper and more violent than ever. I hide under a single blanket, tears pouring uncontrollably down my cheeks. I feel unable to order my thoughts.

All at once I feel heat on my face, seeping through the blanket that I hide under. Sunlight has reached my cell, and, as the chirruping of birds outside filters through, I feel, for just a split second, that the day might be different after all. Grey reality pushes that thought aside.

I stand under the scalding shower but if I thought I could wash the pain away as easily as that I was mistaken. The water is suddenly cold, I hadn't even felt it cooling. How long was I under the water?

I throw on the clothes I left on the floor last night and slip downstairs, praying that nobody hears me.

A quick glance at the debris from last night is enough to bring back the memories and I turn away, trying desperately to block everything from my mind. The kitchen crunches with broken crockery as I rummage through the cupboards for something to eat. I grab a packet of two minute noodles and some Cheezils and get out the back door as fast as I can.

Run-down houses with peeling paint and overgrown lawns line the footpath cracked with weeds. It reminds me of that zombie apocalypse movie I saw a couple of weeks back. Sadly, I think we don't have to wait for the future the post-apocalypse is right here right now. I can't shake off the heaviness. What is the point? Day after day, this is my life, has always been my life. It is only now that I'm beginning to see that some people have it different. It is only now that I recognize this black ugly thing that I live with for what it is. And know that there is no getting away from it.

At the gates of school I feel safer. I hear the laughter and shrieks of friends who always seem to feel excited about something. I learnt a long time ago that it doesn't pay to get excited about anything. I have learnt to shut away any feelings from other people. I give a nod to a couple of people I know and carry on. Hearing about what is happening in their lives just makes me feel the emptiness of my own more intensely. I realize that my whole life is an act. I act as if I'm normal, that I have normal parents who laugh and joke with me, who let me be a bit cheeky. My face covers everything, just as my clothes cover the bruises.

It is hard to focus on the work, as much as I want to. Any escape would help, but all I can hear are my mother's screams and my father's voice booming, anger. It is no better in Biology where we are studying the human body. I stare at the black –lined body shape on the whiteboard and I see only the bruises on my mother. Although the full body bruising images are vivid, her emotions are like x-rays, transparent to what is on the inside.

Throughout the day images and sounds follow me like unwanted shadows I don't even recognize and from which I cannot escape. I sometimes glimpse at other students and teachers wondering if they notice anything, to see if I've given anything away.

I feel as if I am suffocating, that I'm about to cave in. I feel myself breathing too fast but I can't stop it. I hope nobody hears it. Sometime during third period I just slip out, as if I'm invisible. I am invisible, because no-one knows I'm here, and no-one would miss me if I wasn't around.

I find myself walking towards the river. There is no reason, that's just where the road goes. I feel light, as if I could fly away. My head is empty, my body almost doesn't exist. I can see only what is in front of me. I hear the scuffling of my shoes on the gravel, and the way I plod along is a sort of beat – plop, plop, plop, plop. My down-cast eyes are fixed on the road in front and I feel as if my body is no longer mine. The sun beats down and I smell the summer odour of heated grass. Plop, plop, plop, I could walk like this forever and I want to. I would never get tired, I would just walk.

The air in my head is so light that thoughts are just tumbling around. I'm walking away. Maybe that's what I'm doing. I'm leaving, going away. My mind won't let me think about more than just walking away. I know there's more to it than that, because I've thought everyday about going away, leaving it all behind me. But every time I have that idea I think about what might happen and I feel even more afraid. Not today though. Something is blocking my mind and I don't want it to be unblocked.

Over the bridge I follow a path that leaves the road and I stumble down to the river. Without thought I head north. Down here the air is still and heavy and there is a deafening sound of cicadas. The heavy smell of some purple flower is almost over-whelming and I feel a little giddy. I head towards the cooler shade of the willows by the river. I don't want to stop but I think about having a little rest before going on. I don't want anything to stop my walk because I'm scared I'll start thinking and feeling again.

I sit on a willow branch that dangles over the water. It's funny but I don't feel in the least bit hungry or thirsty. From here I can see the dancing swirling circles that skim the iridescent surface of the river. I want to ride them. They would be so soft, so soothing. They would take me far, far away. I could just walk into the water, I've done it heaps of times before. I want to just lie in the cool arms of the river, let them take care of me, comfort me. They would take away the pain.

I take off my school uniform and push out into river, out to where the swirls glint and play. Out here there is nothing but me and the river. Without the pain and the fear I feel so light, a balloon bobbing on the surface. I lie back and lift my face to feel the warmth of the sun. I give myself to the river and when it pulls me down I feel that this is where I belong.
