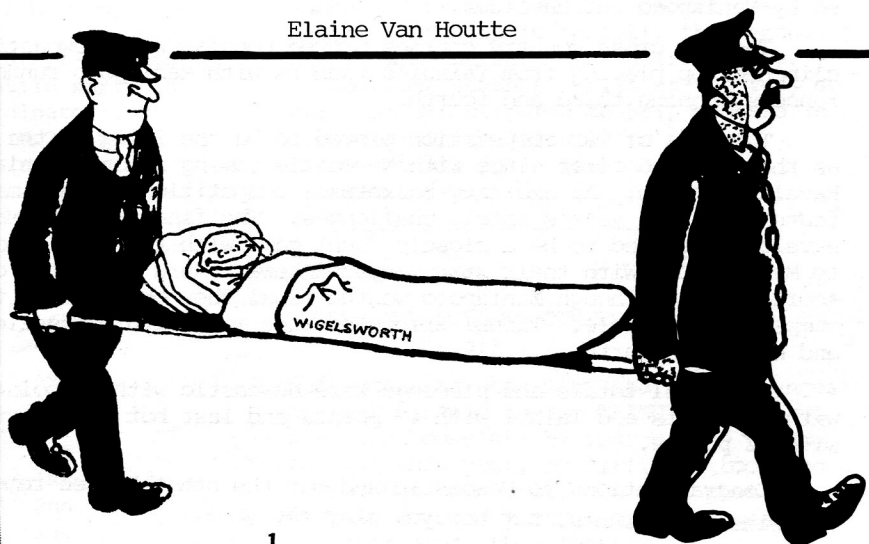
Altogether, the sporting teams have shown both skill and determination and have won against many bigger Hamilton schools. A truly commendable effort from all who participated.

THE FOUNDERS SHIELD

For the past two years Newcastle has hit top form in the obtaining and the holding of the Founders Shield. This year is no exception with Newcastle dominating the various inter-house competitions with Maniapoto and Havelock closely contending for second place, and Tainui, well, all we can do is wish them the best of luck for 1981.

Starting early in the first term, we saw Newcastle take out the swimming competition, followed by Havelock, with Maniapoto and Tainui filling in third and fourth places respectively.

The athletic sports proved to be another successful event for Newcastle with an easy win over Maniapoto and Havelock with Tainui fourth once again.

March came, and once more it was time for the gala day. With heads together, groups desperately sought after an activity which would attract the public's attention. Five thousand dollars was raised overall, three thousand of which was a raffle run by Maniapoto.

A visit from the blood bank gave Tainui the opportunity to move into third place for the first time this year. Newcastle realized that they weren't the only horse in the race as Maniapoto shared top place with them.

The third and final community collection for the school this year was for Corso and once again Maniapoto drew with Newcastle. Havelock and Tainui came third and fourth again.

September came and the Blood Bank returned and this time Newcastle had returned to top spot solo, with Tainui rising to the occasion to obtain second place followed by Maniapoto and Havelock.

The new cross country courses proved popular with Newcastle runners who clinched top placing from Tainui's runners with Maniapoto runners and Havelock runners runners running third and fourth.

The tugs of war competition proved to be the icing on the cake for Tainui as they claimed first place with Newcastle coming second, Maniapoto third and Havelock fourth. An exciting basketball competition was the main feature of this year's shield challenges. The final between Maniapoto 2 and Havelock 4 proved to be a closely fought game with the final score being 24 - 16 to Maniapoto. With their star player Hekewaru Muru scoring 10 of the 12 goals scored. But although Maniapoto won the final they only gained third place in the competition overall. An ex-pupil of our school made it to the Waikato Provincial Rugby team this year. Roger Litt, Waikato full-back, attended Ngaruawahia High School between 1966 and 1970. 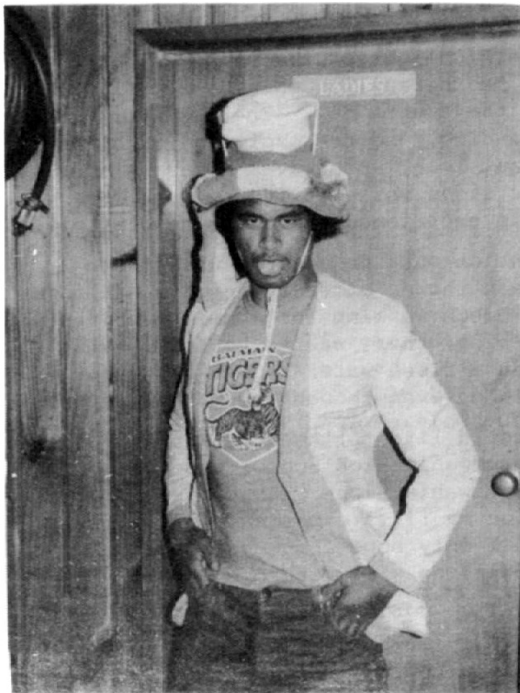

The Spirit of Adventure

The 'Spirit of Adventure', a ship not nearly as relaxing as an excursion vessel yet not so strict as a naval vessel. The sail training ship teaches New Zealanders the hardship and excitement of learning the ropes of a sailing ship.

A routine of being called in the morning at 6 a.m. for physical training (a slight jog around and press-ups) and then overboard for a swim at 8-10°C to awaken and cleanse the body. Breakfast at 6.30 a.m. Assembly on poop deck at 7:55 for the Colours (raising of the flag, 8 a.m. chime on the bell and the "Carry on" whistle). Dismissed to cleaning stations. The ship was cleaned every morning. Various different things happened each day after the ship was cleaned.

The crew on board consisted of 25 trainees, divided into 3 watches - Red, White and Blue - the Captain, Mr Nicklaus Hylton, 3 Watch Officers, a Cook, an Engineer and the Voyage Leader Geoff Sinclair.

Confined to the Hauraki Gulf meant very little to us. The Gulf is hardly a millpond! In ten days we had only managed to explore under half of the Gulf. In fact, little attention was paid to our travels, as long as we were experiencing the enjoyment of sailing, everybody was content.

Geoff who was a past trainee, (he was 20 years old), had the job of helping us to appreciate the necessity of order, sort out any problems and generally guide the trainees. He earned our respect; we even went as far as to decorate his cabin completely with toilet paper!

Much of the first three days was spent on lectures of importance in running a vessel. These necessary subjects included:- Safety features (Man-Over-Board Drill; Fire Drill; Distress Signals; Anchor Watch; Collisions), Navigation, Sail Training (Theory),

Maintenance and Meteorology. Although these lectures sound very boring they proved to be most helpful. The practical theory of these lectures were at times very amusing!

Such adventures as A Man-Over-Board Drill to save a hat in distress, which had been caught by a gust of wind; a Fire Drill in the Mess Deck while the fire hose was taken to the Bridge; and my disaster of unbalancing one small, fibre glass training yacht while boarding it (amazingly the water was wet!!)

Unfortunately for me, my sleeping accommodations were not the best. At three stories high, an opening of two foot by four foot to climb in to, a roof decline in the aisle (which occasionally left a few marks in my back) and a leaking skylight in bad weather. This did not, at all, reflect upon the facilities. My bunk was the only one in an awkward position to get in to and my size didn't help much either. This problem is to be corrected in the 'Refit '80' though. The six wooden bunks are to be replaced by folding, steel frame bunks.

I would like to thank Mr Murphy, the Ngaruawahia High School and the Ngaruawahia Lions Club for sponsoring me on my first experience of sailing and I only hope that the opportunity of sailing will return someday.

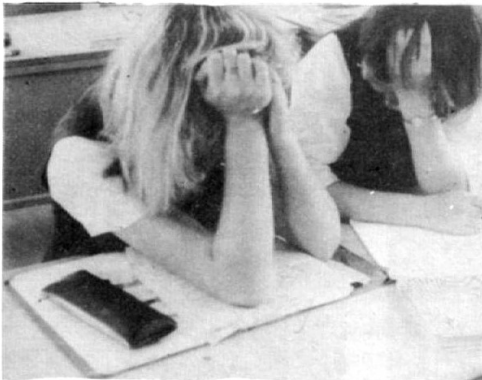

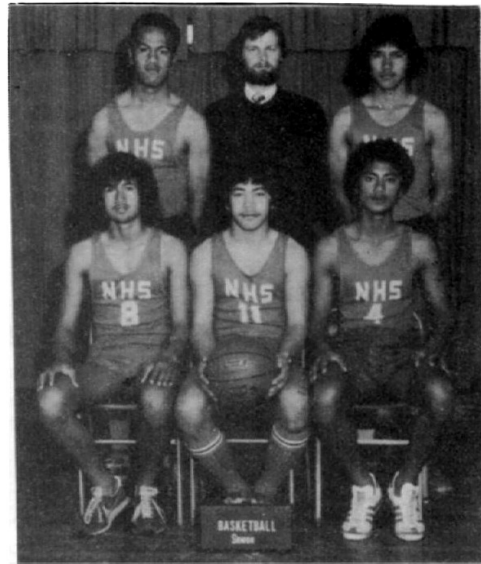

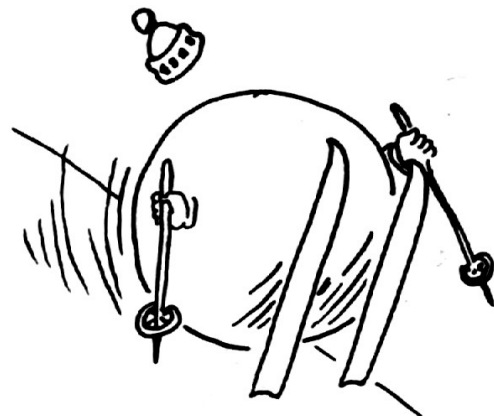

The team played 20 games this season winning eleven, scoring 60 goals and conceding 42.

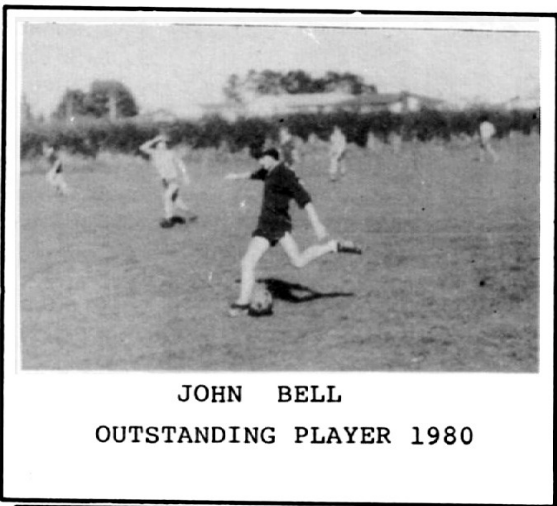
