The Spirit of Adventure

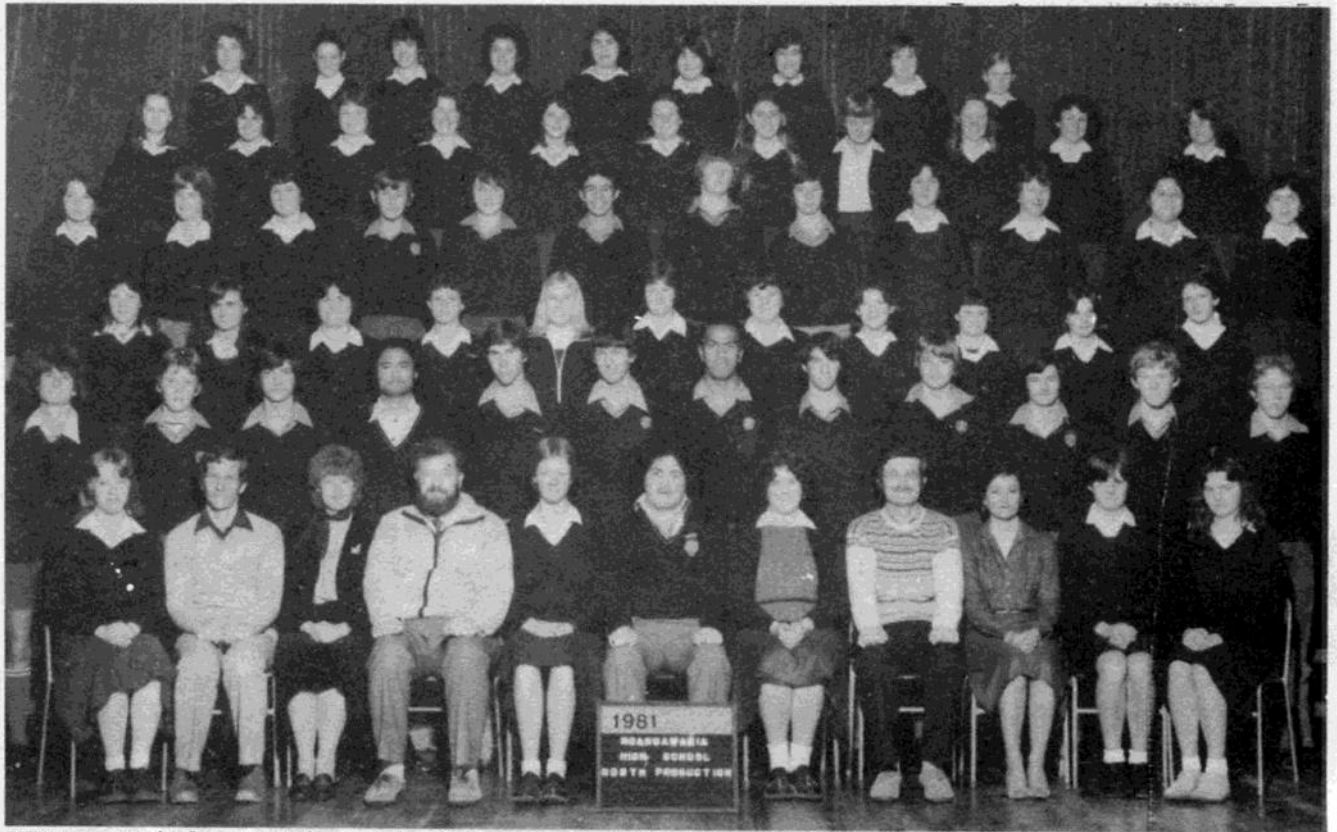

Most of the show was in fact Robyn's dream and involved all the usual Robyn Hood type adventures including the rescue of the beautiful Princess Phillipa who had been captured by sheriff's soldiers so that he could force her to marry him.

One of the most satisfying aspects of the production was the wide range of personnel involved. Older teachers, younger teachers, parents, senior pupils and junior combined together to form a united team.

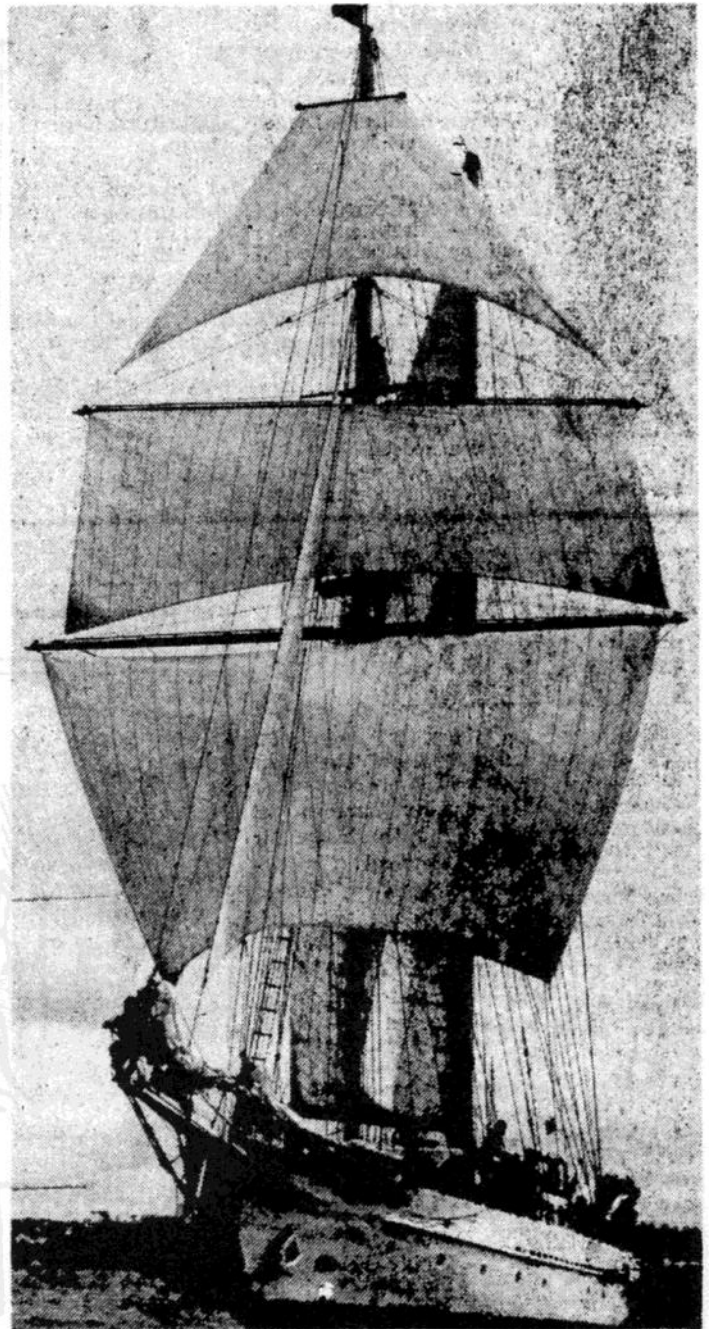

The Spirit of Adventure

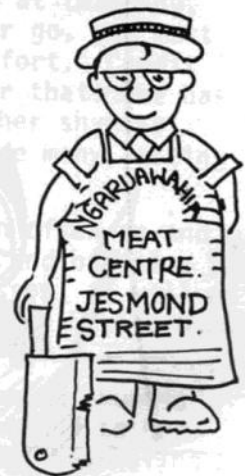
The Spirit of Adventure.

On Tuesday 20th of January 1981, I was selected to go on a once in a life time sailing experience on the Spirit of Adventure. This particular voyage was from Auckland to Napier, a 10 day sailing excursion. Six officer's and twenty five trainees from all over New Zealand formed the crew. The 25 trainees were divided into three watches - red, white and blue; of course white was the best, which I was put in. Each watch had a certain sector of the ship to be responsible for, also including kitchen duties of (wash the dishes, dry the dishes, turn the dishes over). There were lectures on such subjects as Navigation, Anchoring, Emergency Equipment, Compass construction, Sailing theory, meteorology and Practical lectures on ropework. One of my dislikes, of the voyage was getting up at 5.30 a.m to go for a swim, which was very unpleasant, or in other words bloody terrible. But this was a routine which had a purpose. One piece of item which did not require lectures on, but had to be followed by precise instruction was the heads (Toilet). This item required vigorous and strenuous pumping action to flush, after your daily succession. The highlight of the voyage was a two day stop over at Mahia Peninsula. We were allowed to explore this peninsula to find and study unique sealife, certain species of seabirds, and fluctuated sun tanned bodies resting upon the beach (GIRLS). Entering the Hawke Bay harbour where Napier is located we finally reached our destination the tenth day. On reflection, the voyage proved very enjoyable and especially the rewarding efforts I put into the voyages was worth it. As a result of my efforts I had gained and presented to me a silver mounted trophy replica of the Spirit of Adventure, valued at \$5,000.00 for the most improved trainee. So I hope in the future, pupils within the school who are selected to Voyage the Spirit of Adventure, will try hard to achieve this.

WATERSKIING

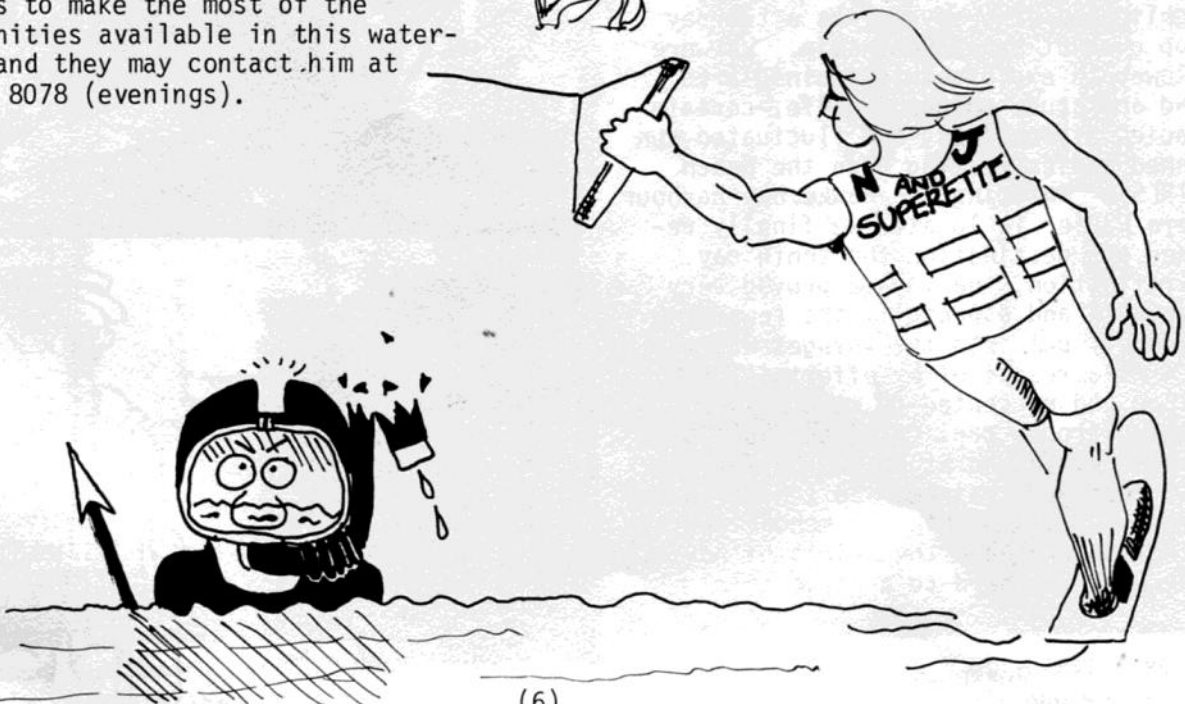
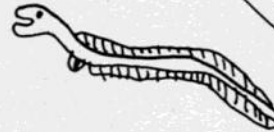
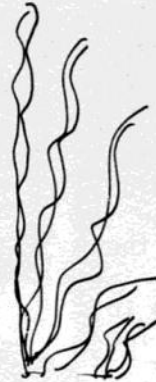

THE CAUSE OF VIOLENCE IN OUR SOCIETY

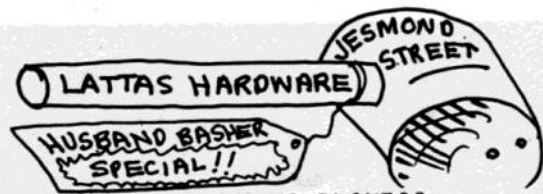
It's an ordinary weeknight, well ordinary for most people. But not for little Johnnie. Johnnie has a black eye, cut lip, various bodily bruising and a possible broken arm. Been out fighting with his mates, you think. But NO!. It's his dad's idea of a mild punishment. And Johnnie's one of the lucky ones he hasn't lost his sight by a slap with a budded belt across his face or been whipped with an electric jug cord. Then there's Mrs Smith, she's a mother of two and pregnant. She's just been bashed up and kicked in the stomach by a drunk husband. Both those people are victims of domestic violence.

There are a few laws which try to deter people who are violent in a family situation but often the wife has no personal money and nowhere to go. There are various Half-Way Houses around N.Z. for battered women but not nearly enough to help all those in need. They just don't receive the aid, especially financial, that they need. Do you know, that in

most cases of domestic murder, assault or rape the assailant is well known to the victim, a friend or family. But society doesn't want to know, it ignores this fact and pretends that all you have to do is: not talk to strangers and not go out on the streets at night, and you'll be safe. You hope.

And what about Mr. Jones he's just been bashed up by his wife. That's what the rest of society does, but it doesn't help the victim much does it? In most cases of husband bashing the thought of being publicly humiliated in a court stops them from taking any sort of action. These men are abandoned by society and for the rest of their lives are haunted by the knowledge that no-one cares. No-one cares because they are men, they are the ones stereo-typed as the protectors and strength in a community. And because of this they are ignored and shunned by the rest of society.

So although it is basically women and children who get bashed up, men do to. (16)



BUT WHO IS REALLY TO BLAME??

The husband, wife or parent who does the bashing? No, look deeper and you will see that a lot of it stems from society's attitudes towards violence. It is society which condones certain aspects of violence says men who get assaulted by women are cowards and that women who get raped asked for it.

Perhaps you are wondering how society condones violence. Well, what corporal punishment in schools. Corporal punishment is still used as a deterrent for trouble makers and nuisances. But look at the list of people caned and you'll see the same names recurring. There is even the paradoxical situation of a boy being caned for fighting in the school grounds. Punishing violence with violence, what on earth is that supposed to teach the boy. The only thing which this form of legitimate violence does and studies have proven, it is to turn these kids into tomorrow's future violent offenders.

And that's not the only form of condoned violence in our society. What about our national sport. Good old Rugby! At times it is hard to tell if it's a rugby match going on or a free for all brawl in the centre of the field. But who cares? Because it is occurring in our national male sport and no-one bats an eye and besides a few good punches liven up a game especially if your side is on the safer end of the fists.

What about when scrums were collapsed and a neck got broken, who got blamed for that act of violence, certainly not the true culprits, not society. It just looks the other way, as usual.

It is an act of violence, yet why does the fact it's being done by teams on a field excuse it. What makes these men any different from Mrs. Smith's husband or Johnnie's dad. There is no difference and yet nothing is done about it.

So really it is no wonder that the kids of today are growing up to become confused adults, unable to distinguish between illegal and condoned violence. Look at the last generation. They've grown up with legal violence and now we have the highest rate of domestic

They went to Australia the next day, though their flight was delayed for an hour because of rain.

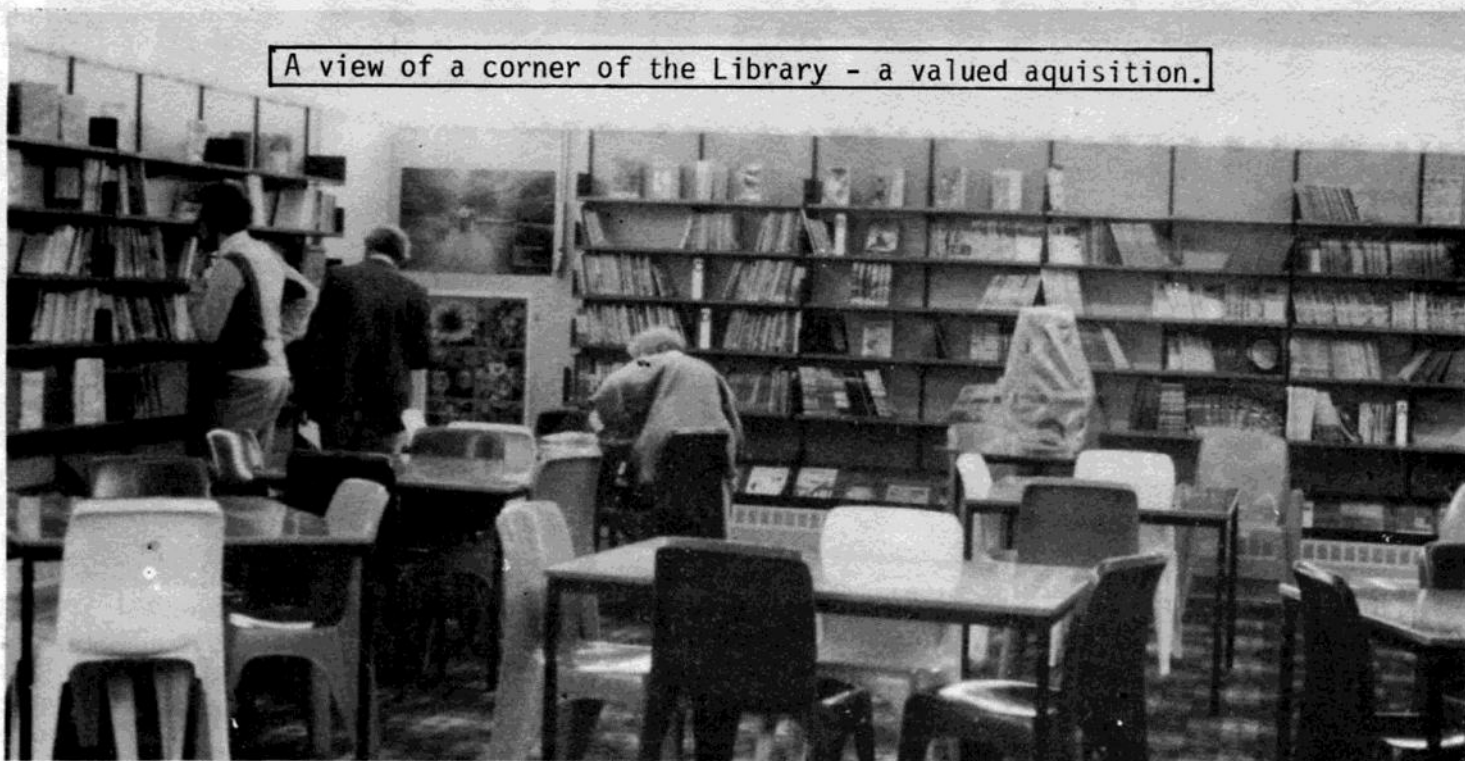

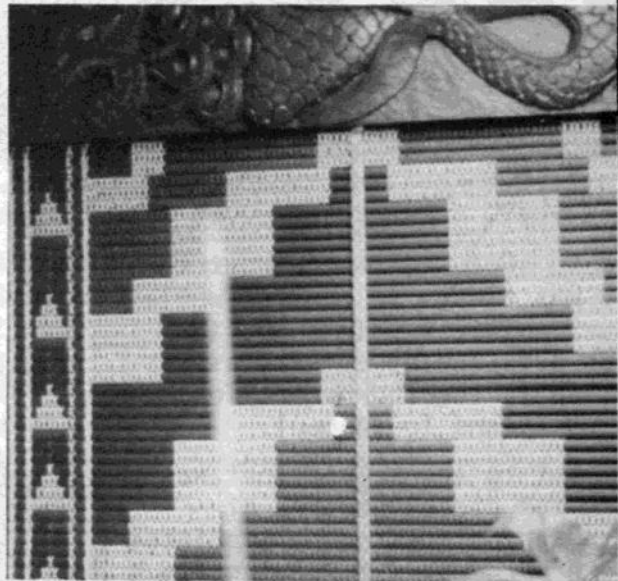

LEGISLATION CONCERNING LITTER WAS INTRODUCED INTO N.Z. IN 1968 AND WAS AMENDED IN 1979. IT CONSISTS OF A LITTER CONTROL PLAN FOR N.Z. AND AN ASSESSMENT AND EVALUATION OF AN ALTERNATE MEANS OF LITTER CONTROL.

1. THE PEDESTRIAN THAT LITTERS.
2. THE MOTORIST THAT LITTERS.
3. SPILLS FROM UNCOVERED TRAILERS AND COMMERCIAL VEHICLES.
4. ACCUMULATING LITTER THEN DEPOSITING IT IN AN INAPPROPRIATE AREA.
5. THE PUTTING OUT OF THE WRONG REFUSE CONTAINER AS DEFINED BY THE SPECIFIC COUNTY COUNCIL.

FROM THIS DEFINITION OF LITTER THAT COVERS SO WIDE AN AREA WE CAN APPRECIATE THE PROBLEM IN TRYING TO POLICE AND ENFORCE THE LITTER LAWS, BUT WE CAN BE ASSURED ACTION IS BEING TAKEN.

IN ADDITION TO THAT, LITERATURE CAN BE OBTAINED FREE FROM ALL COUNTY COUNCILS, AND ALL LITTER OFFICERS ARE AVAILABLE TO SPEAK TO INDIVIDUALS AND INSTITUTIONS SUCH AS SCHOOLS, FACTORIES AND BUSINESSES. WHILE MONETARY PUNISHMENT MUST BE USED TO CRIPPLE LITTER, AND SHOCK TREATMENT OF THE NILVERM TYPE COULD HELP ENORMOUSLY, THESE ARE NEGATIVE WAYS OF KEEPING OUR COUNTRY CLEAN.
