PRINCIPAL

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT 1983

The full school commenced with a roll number of 628 which was according to our predictions and approximate to the previous year's numbers. We welcomed three permanent new staff members: Miss L.Duncan B.Sc. teaching Science, Biology and Mathematics; Ms I.Packham Dip.F.A., Art; and Mr A.McIntosh B.A. teaching Geography, Social Studies and English. Two teachers were appointed on a long term relieving basis: Mrs J.Myles taking Slow Learners and Home Economics; and Mr J.Clayton B.A. taking the Pre-Employment Scheme, English and Social Studies.

For opening day the Craftroom was an additional facility provided by the Department of Education and Mr Jarnet, under Mr Templeton's direction, has expanded the Technical Craft course providing for both boys and girls. A new English Resource area and Audio-Visual store room was also completed.

The Annual Waiheke Island Outdoor Education exercise under Mr Grinter and eight teachers continued for the fourth time. Fifteen Seventh-formers - who were further developing leadership skills introduced the previous year at a post-accrediting camp under Ms Thomson, Mr Robb and Miss Bergers at Tauranga - assisted the staff in the repeated success of this outdoor education exercise.

Our 1982 exam passes were well up to our high standards with four Form 7 students gaining University Bursaries and 22 gaining University Entrance (16 by accrediting and 6 by exam passes), giving a pass rate of over 61%.

The sporting scene at the commencement of the year saw the introduction of the first regular competitive cricket teams at Ngaruawahia High School with four teams in regular competition under Mr Abraham, assisted by Mr Weren, Mr McIntosh and Mr Clayton. We are most grateful to the local Cricket Club for assistance in providing a practice wicket.

A feature of the year was the successful venture overseas by two large sporting parties, the rugby group to Singapore and Malaysia, the hockey girls and basketball boys to Australia. Both parties were well supported by a strong group of parents in their fund-raising and the success, turn-out and general conduct of both groups brought credit to the school and community.

In Mrs Storey's Commercial Department results have been outstanding this year with: 100% pass rate in the Pitmans Elementary Typewriting with 27 passes; In Intermediate Typewriting there was 5 First Class passes with 4 students gaining a 90% pass rate; in Advanced Typewriting 3 First Class passes were attained, 2 passes, with only 2 non-passes.

In the Goethe Society Examinations conducted by the University of Waikato, Mrs Schneider's Language Department continued to achieve highly with 8 pupils Highly Commended and 14 Commended out of 22 entrants.

The school, so often criticised locally for any initiative as in 1978 when we participated in an International Festival at Aberdeen and the Edinburgh Festival, was posed the question "Is the school's priority in sport or academic achievement?" Without an emphasis on sport, travel and the experience of interaction with other people, school would be a dull, sterile academic institution with resultant low achievement.

A notable English Scholar and Poet once stated:
'You go to a great school not so much for knowledge as for arts and habits - for the habit of attention, for the art of expression, for the art of assuming at a moment's notice a new intellectual position, for the art of entering quickly into another person's thoughts, for the

habit of submitting to censure and refutation, for the art of indicating assent and dissent in graduated terms, for the habit of regarding minute points of accuracy, for the art of working at what is possible in a given time, for taste, for discrimination, for mental courage, and for mental soberness.'

These concepts also would be more attainable if we could eliminate the emotional injustice of accrediting for University Entrance and place the attainment of such by examination at the end of the 7th Form year, which would provide two years for broader, more soundly based courses in order to motivate our young people of University potential to a tangible goal, as, following School Certificate, a two year effort. Sixth Form Certificate would then be fully recognised as a general qualification for the commercial world after four years.

Currently we have Form 7 students who have attained University Entrance through concentrated academic study in Form 6 and then lose their incentive as they perceive an empty goal of a \$200 Bursary.

Secondary Schools are fettered in their efforts to develop Form 6 courses by an outdated Examination/Accrediting system. I urge parents to become more aware of the enforced restriction on change to meet our rapidly changing times, and support the plea of schools to create more practically relevant programmes, approved by the Department of Education, and to provide more realistically for the large numbers of senior students who are returning to school without any intention of University education.

Under the direction of our Guidance Counsellor, Ms J.Thomson, a Reading Tutor Programme has been introduced with the aim of giving assistance on a one-to-one basis to all students who need help with their reading, from both senior students and adults from the community. Thirty senior students gave up their own study time, twice a week, and five adults - Mr Jim Francis, Mrs Dianne Utting, Mrs Josie Tressider, Mrs Anne Powlesland and Mrs Alice Runciman. We are most grateful to these people for their time generously given to our pupils.

A comprehensive survey of the need for adult education has been undertaken by Miss Pamela Milne and Miss Sandra Vallett under the direction of Ms Thomson. The plan has been to identify both needs and existing resources in order to bring the school closer to the community. An excellent public relations exercise has been conducted, hopefully bringing increased evening classes next year and more adults in day classes.

Complimentary to this exercise has been the continued regular publication of "Ngaruawahia Comment" under the control of Mr Abraham, Mr Clayton and senior students.

Our Orchestra has performed with distinction at the Secondary Schools Festival as well as at our contributing schools.

The school gained numerous successes in winter sports. The 1st Rugby XV, coached by Mr Grinter and managed by Mr McIntosh, was awarded the Waikato Rugby Union President's Trophy for the best disciplined team in the Waikato Secondary Schools' seven-a-side Tournament at Te Awamutu. On College Day, successfully held at Ngaruawahia under the school's organisation, our 1st XV gained further distinction by being awarded the Vic McKenzie Shield for the most enterprising team among Waikato Secondary Schools.

The Captain, Joseph Tahana, represented Waikato for the third consecutive year, assisting Mr Grinter's Representative team win the Hughes and Cossar Tournament for the second successive year.

The 2nd XV, coached by Mr Weren, 3rd XV by Mr Jarnet and the 4th XV team by Mr Clayton all achieved success.

The girls' hockey teams coached by Miss Bergers, continued to achieved their traditional success - the "A" Team winning the Waikato Womens' 3rd Grade Championship for the second year, and also the Helen Gordon Trophy for supremacy among Waikato schools. Four girls represented Waikato Secondary Schools: Jan Plummer, Alison Baird, Jane

Boys Hockey continued successfully under Mr Clark with strong, young support.

Our senior Netball team played for the first time in the Waikato Secondary Schools' Competition at Cobham Drive Courts under Mrs J.Myles, and benefitted considerably. Three teams remained under Mrs Dixon's direction at Taupiri.

Girls' Soccer under the control of Miss Crawford completed a good season and we are most grateful to the Ngaruawahia and Taupiri Clubs through Mr Vickers and Mrs Caulfield for providing Saturday soccer for our pupils.

Miss L.Duncan organised our Badminton teams for a successful season with the Girls' team reaching the semi-final in the Waikato Inter-School Tournament.

In rowing our girls have come to the forefront this year. We are most grateful to the Ngaruawahia Rowing Club for their enthusiasm

and interest in providing this notable national sport for our pupils. In the Maadi Cup Regatta at Karapiro the Girls Four was placed second in the Under-17 New Zealand Final. In the Eights (Under-16) our girls were placed 3rd in the New Zealand Final. These were outstanding success for novice crews.

Indoor basketball, controlled by Mr Paurini, is a strong sport within the school, with girls teams coached by Mr Mans, Ms Thomson and Mrs Mawer. The boys field three team mid-week and the Premier team has been successful in two Under-20 competitions and gained the Challenge

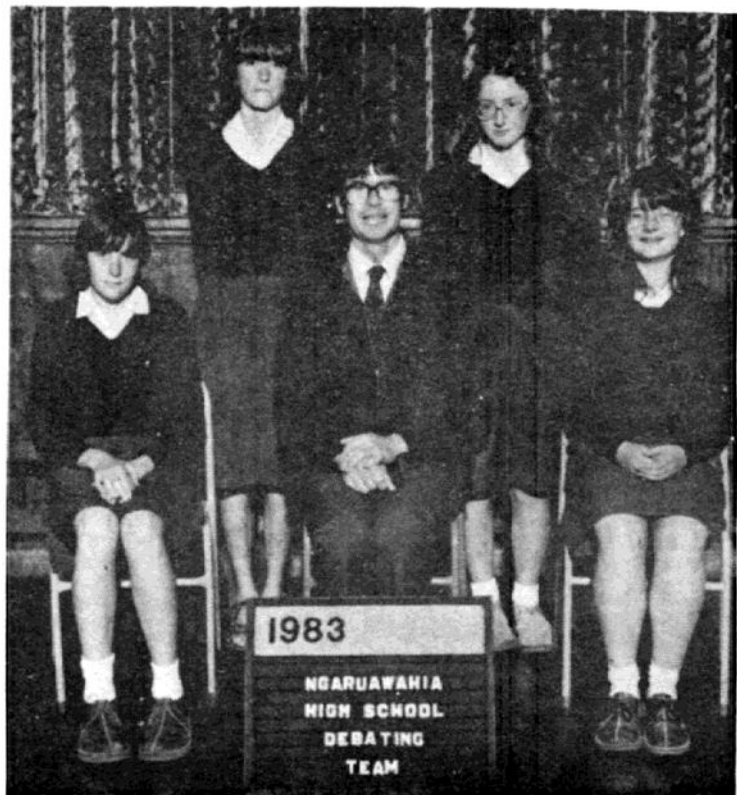

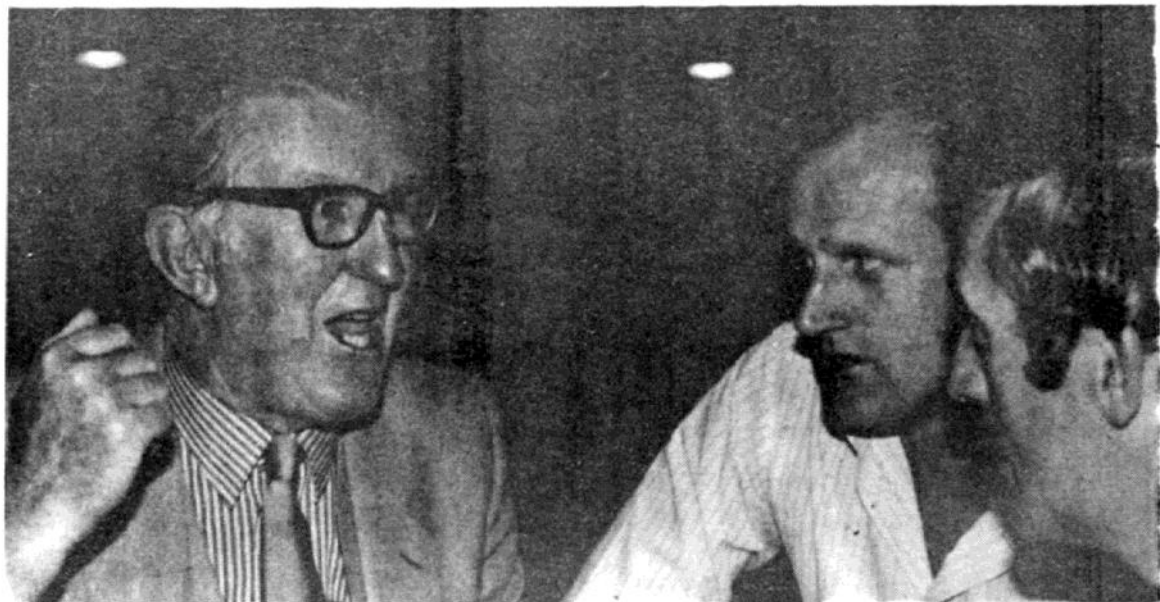

Our most competitive game was against Fraser High School. Both teams played with great spirit and we snatched victory by the narrowest possible margin of one run!

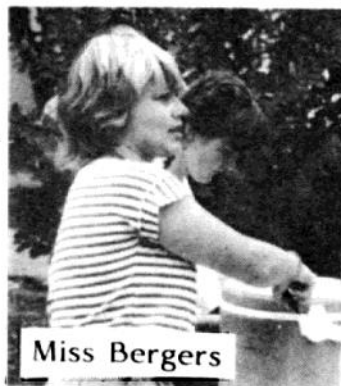

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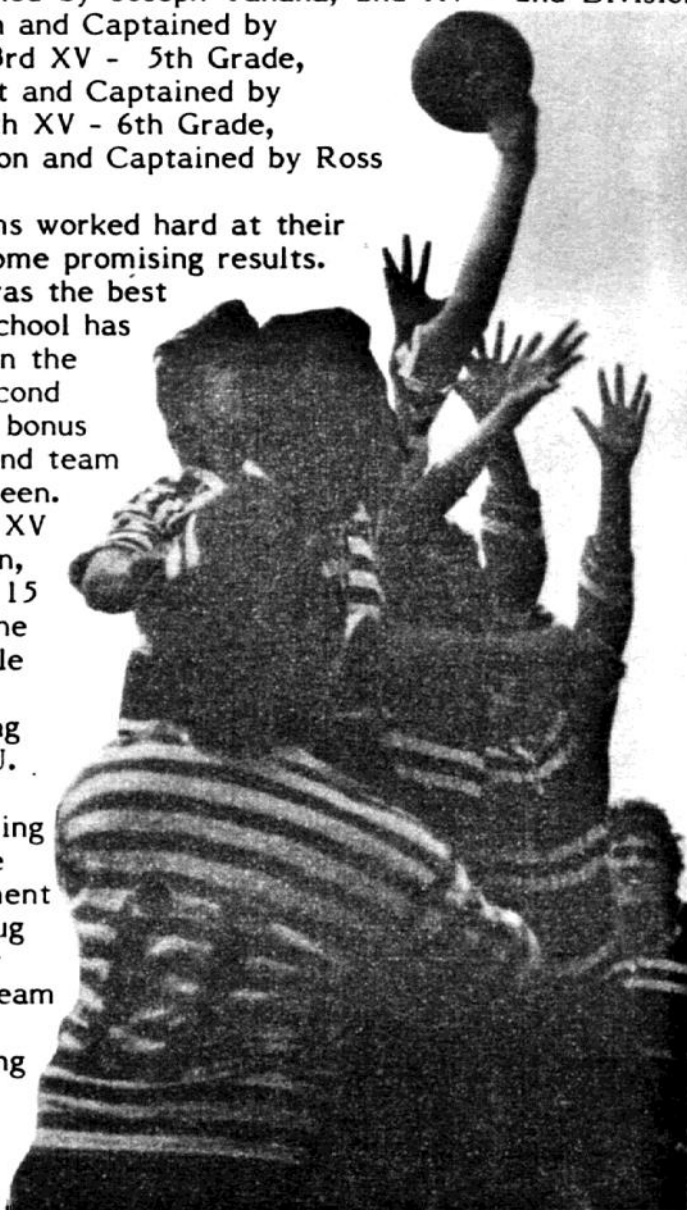
RUGBY

Four teams again represented the school in the following grades of the Waikato Secondary Schools' Rugby Union: 1st XV - First Division, Coached by Mr Grinter & Mr McIntosh and Captained by Joseph Tahana; 2nd XV - 2nd Division Coached by Mr Weren and Captained by Clifford McRoberts; 3rd XV - 5th Grade, Coached by Mr Jarnet and Captained by Malcolm Flattery; 4th XV - 6th Grade, Coached by Mr Clayton and Captained by Ross Smith.

All teams worked hard at their game and produced some promising results. The Second Fifteen was the best Second Fifteen this school has ever had and played in the top section of the Second Division. It is a real bonus to have a strong second team to feed the First Fifteen.

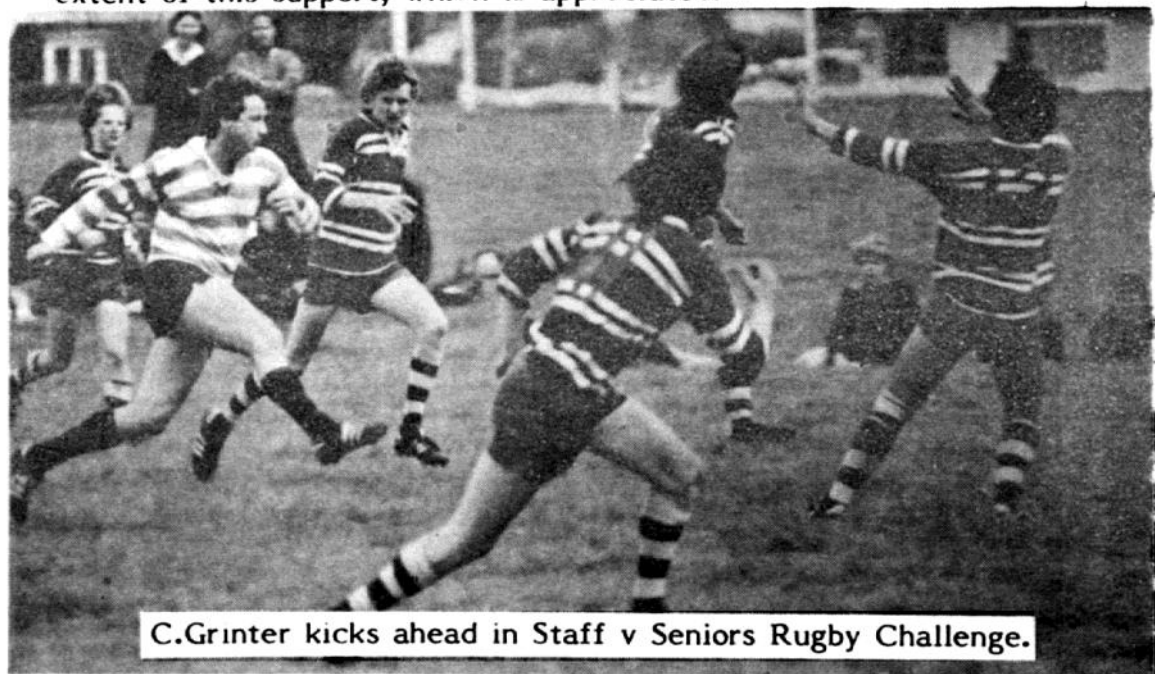

1st XV ASIAN TOUR 1983 August 29th - Sept. 12th

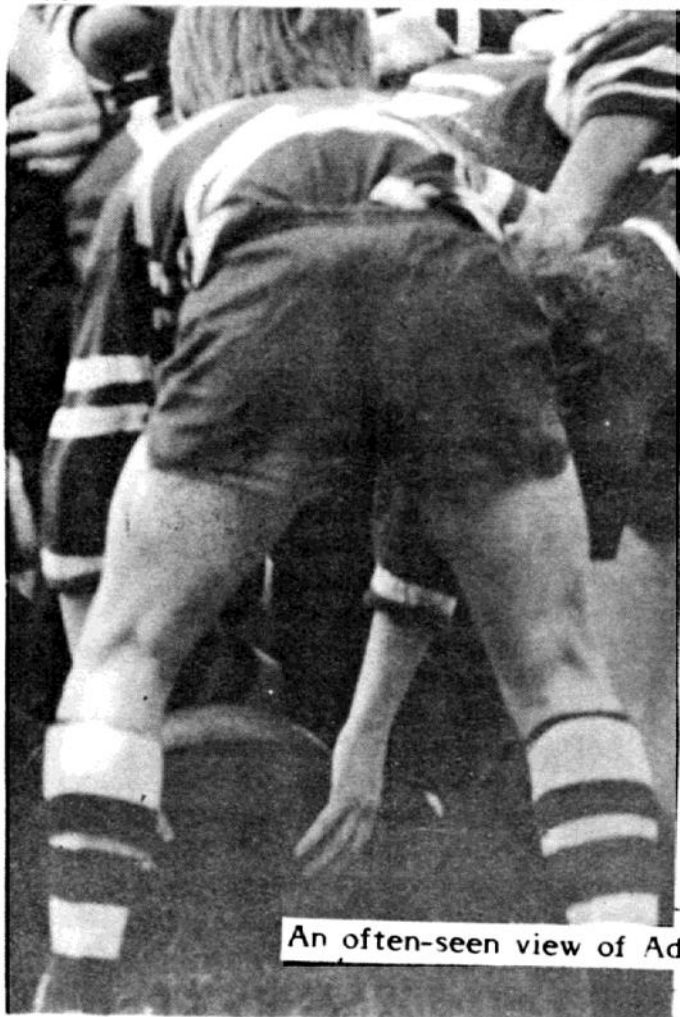

Oh, you Maori people
You are the ones
The key to the moon and sun
Such a proud race
Yesterday, today, tomorrow
You will always be the ones.

I look back, back through time and I silently view the beauty and splendour of our Maori heritage.

The old world created by our Polynesian ancestors has passed away, and a new world is in the process of being fashioned. The stone temples have been destroyed and the temple drums and shell trumpets have long been silent. Tane, Tu, Rongo, Tangaroa and the other members of the divine family of the sky-father and the Earth-mother have left us. The great voyaging canoes have crumbled to dust and the sea-captains and the expert craftsmen have passed away to the spirit-land. The regalia and symbols of spiritual and temporal power have been scattered amongst the museums of other peoples. The old net is full of holes, its meshes have rotted and it has been laid aside. Which new net goes fishing now?

Today the Maori is more or less thrown onto the 'trash heap' of modern society. Why? Because the pakeha is attempting to overpower the Maori in all aspects of life.

The world of the Maori rotates in one vicious cycle. It begins with our education where the majority of staff members are PAKEHA! Where the highest position, being that of Principal, is more often than not - PAKEHA! Our curriculum revolves around the PAKEHA way of life.

Where does this leave the average teenage Maori? Brought up with Maori traditions and customs and yet when the real world hits him, the whole reality of his being and his heritage are of little or no importance. This is where we watch yet another confused Maori fall from the rotational PAKEHA wheel. He lands on the carpet of unemployment where the majority of each fibre is populated by a Maori. He then senses even more rejection which rapidly leads him to the criminal world of petty

theft. Who is he arrested by? A PAKEHA! Who is he tried and sentenced by? THE PAKEHA! Where does he end up? In a prison where approximately 70% of the inmates are Maori.

It's alright for me to stand up here and moan and groan about the low position of the Maori today. But are you and I, as Maoris, really making an attempt to get up and do something about it? NOT REALLY!

Face the facts - we cannot all step forward, push the Pakeha back, and then attempt to overpower them. We must aim for equality. Otherwise all we are really achieving is to change the colour of the headman and all his little helpers.

Many years ago the New Zealand scholar, Sir Peter Buck, made the prediction that the New Zealander of tomorrow would inherit from both Maori and Pakeha heritages; the qualities which would make him "an outstanding figure among the differing races of the world".

He was not seen in Sir Peter Buck's time, nor has he yet arrived in these modern times. The ideal New Zealander continues to exist as just that - simply ideal.

Cultures are not static. They do not stand still. Both Maori and Pakeha cultures will gradually merge and a New Zealand culture will evolve in their place. This is what the New Zealander of tomorrow will inherit. His inheritance will not come easily. It is something which even he, perhaps, may have to fight

for. But the reward will be truly worth the effort.

To all the Maori people, remember that confidence is the key word. Without confidence achievement is nigh. It is a high compliment for any man to say that those who know him best, love him most. This may be truly said generally of the Maori race. Those who dislike the Maori people are those who know nothing of them in reality. For a thousand acts of unselfish kindness, for unbounded hospitality, for tender care, for heroic devotion, my love and gratitude bind me to the Maori till I die.

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READING TUTOR SCHEME

Developmental Reading was commenced in 1976, Ngaruawahia High School being the first in the Waikato to introduce such a scheme. Considerable research and study was undertaken before the scheme was set up, this being done by John Moir (deputy Principal) and Mrs Middleton.

As a natural development of this the Reading Tutor Scheme was implemented earlier this year by Ms J.Thomson and Mrs Middleton, and is proving very successful. Five adult tutors from the community along with over 20 senior students have been working with about 40 pupils from the junior school. Many have developed a close relationship in helping these pupils to read better. Nearly all who have been associated with the programme have found it worthwhile.

ADULT EDUCATION

In July our High School Board employed a Community Liason Officer and Secretary to research the relationship between the community and the High School.

Pam Milne is the Liason Officer. She graduated from Waikato University and has a Bachelor of Social Science, majoring in Psychology. Sandra Vallet is a past pupil and employee of the school and is Secretary to Pam. She has been in the community for many years and has a personal interest in the implementation of an adult education scheme.

Questionnaires were devised with the help of Classes 3.1 and 3.4 and distributed randomly throughout Ngaruawahia and the rural areas. Staff also completed a questionnaire to discover their views on adult education.

The results of the survey indicated that the community would like the school to offer more in terms of night classes and more use of the school facilities. Fifty-seven night-classes in all were listed by respondents but some, like homeopathy and reflexology were only listed by one person and would therefore not be viable. Most popular were art, budgeting, computer studies, cake decorating, cooking, carpentry, craft, dressmaking, hairdressing/grooming, motor mechanics, maori studies, pottery, typing, yoga, academic studies (English, maths, science) and European languages. *These subjects have been approved by the Department of Education and will be offered early next year.*

Although most people thought the relationship between the community and the School was satisfactory, a high percentage felt it could and should be improved. This is, in part, being carried out by the community being invited to take part in Day and Night classes. Also the involvement of some adults in a Reading Tutor Scheme for pupils with this specific difficulty; guidance department programmes in the area of communicating with teenagers, drug education, transition from school, and so on. All of these programmes are helping the school/community relationship.

There seems to be quite a bit of interest concerning returning to High School as an adult Day Student, and most people said they would use the school facilities such as the school library, gymnasium, hall, sports equipment, etc, if they were made more open to the public.

The overall impression that one gets from the survey is that the majority of the people in the community know very little, or nothing, about the High School and what it offers. It is hoped that this can be improved in the near future. There is quite a range of skills and hobbies that respondents said they would teach, and ways can be found to tap the potential of some of these without going too far afield. The school would be very interested to hear of any ways you can help the Community Education idea.

Most of the respondents found school enjoyable to varying degrees, and would probably enjoy returning but many have genuine fears about returning as an adult. These include: being embarrassed, feeling silly or unsure, shy, stupid, feeling old, and so on. It must be emphasised that adults who have taken the plunge and returned to school are generally very pleased they did. They may have had fears and misconceptions about joining in with younger students, but found in reality that it was not as difficult as they first thought.

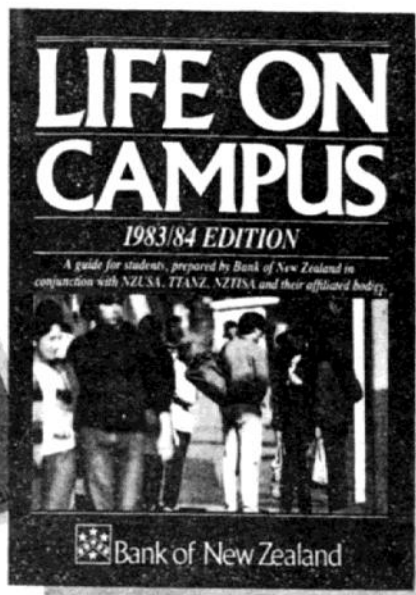
These results have enabled the High School to decide how to better serve the community. The school wishes to stress that not only are adults welcome at Night Classes, they all also welcome and encouraged to return to school as Day students. This can mean doing full-time School Certificate, University Entrance or Bursary courses, or a few individual subjects. If you are 18 years old or have left school for two years you are eligible to take part in the programme.

The subjects available to Adult Day Students in 1984 are: English, Pure Maths, Applied Maths, Science, Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Engineering, Woodwork, Accounting, Home Economics, History, Typing, Shorthand, Draughting, Craft, Art, European Studies (French & German), Maori Studies (Language & Culture), Economic Studies, Clothing & Textiles, Geography, Music Horticulture, Physical Education and Computer Studies.

Any subjects not available can be done by correspondence, which is arranged by the School.

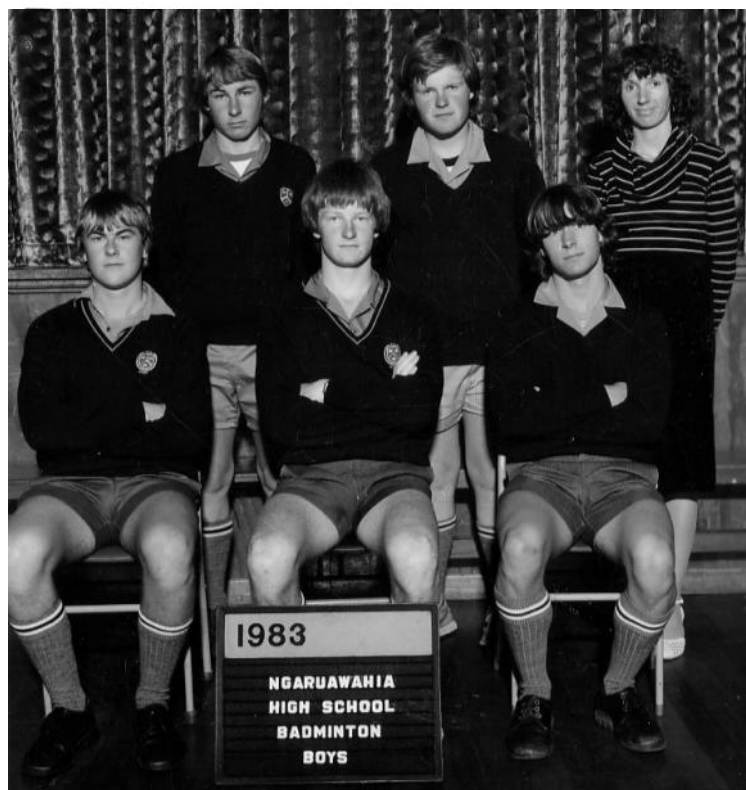

We did not lose a match at home and we did not win a match away! So there is some truth in the phrase that the home team has an advantage.

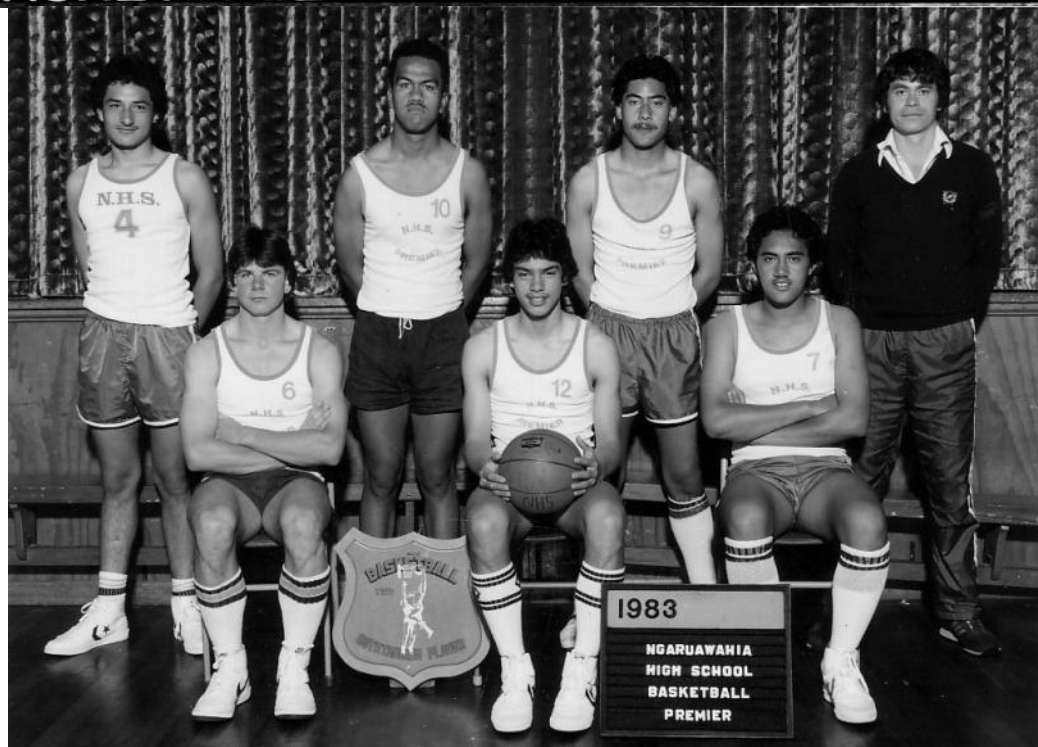

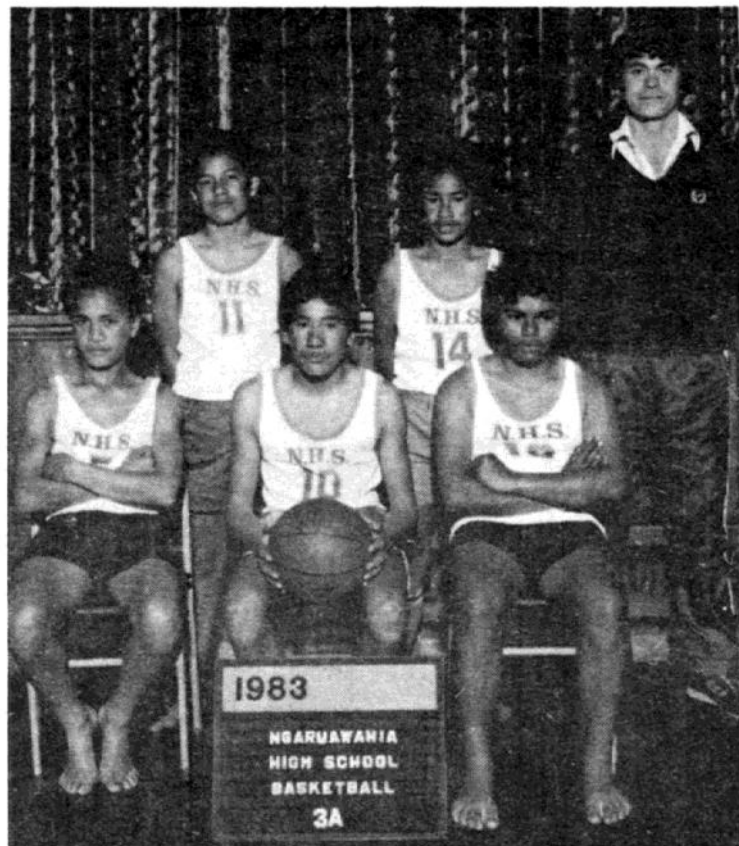
