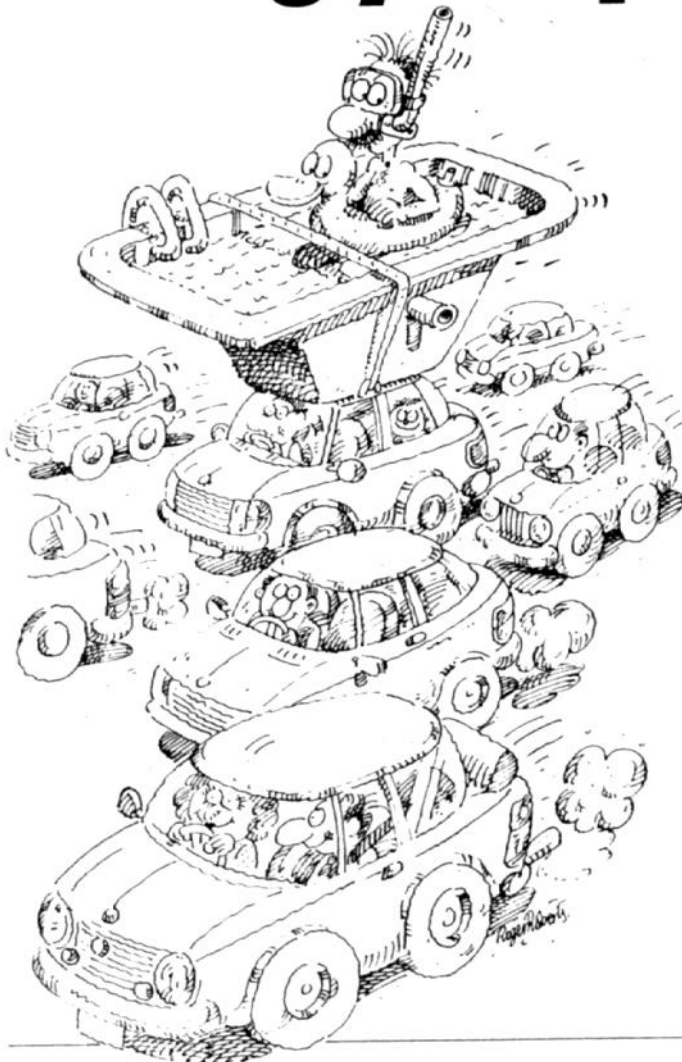

At the end of this year the school completes its 25th year. The Honours Board at the back of the assembly hall of both academic and sporting achievement indicate the success of so many former students in these fields.

Probably, more importantly is the large number who have settled into good positions of employment or established their own businesses and become good citizens of a N Z Community. I meet them almost every day as so many ex-students now have their own children at this High School and it is such a pleasure to see them.

This year we all shared our grief in the senseless loss of D Block. John Bradshaw in his Prizegiving speech conveyed the sentiments of so many in his memorable address.

Ms Stone M.Z.(Hons) who taught History and English and Mrs Winton who is well remembered as a Typewriting, Shorthand and Secretarial teacher. Mrs Bruning as a part-time Typewriting teacher

and Mr Schwass B.Soc.Sc. in Senior Economics and Mathematics as a staff stalwart and a skilled teacher. Mr Van Tiel M.Sc.(Hons) has lately joined as a regular relief teacher. Also, most important to the functioning of a school is the office personnel and there we have Mrs Gallichan, Mrs Nikora and Mrs Keast who is also Board of Governors Secretary.

Like the legendary Phoenix rising from the ashes the school carries on with a new CEBUS block for 1988 and emphasises that the most important of all is the people, te tangata, and above all the quality of the people. We are all shaped in life by the quality of the people we meet and those who influence us. We are fortunate in this school to enjoy the best traditions both Maori and European, may we always treasure them.

Our Sir Douglas Carter Library opened in 1981 and was provided by the Education Department following the outstandingly successful tour in 1978 of our Maori Cultural Group which participated with distinction in the International Youth Festival of Performing Arts in Aberdeen, Scotland; the famous Edinburgh Festival; toured South West England; performed at Disneyland, Los Angeles, and featured on BBC-Television. For me this was the greatest single achievement of the school in 25 years and it was a great privilege and honour to lead it.

time.

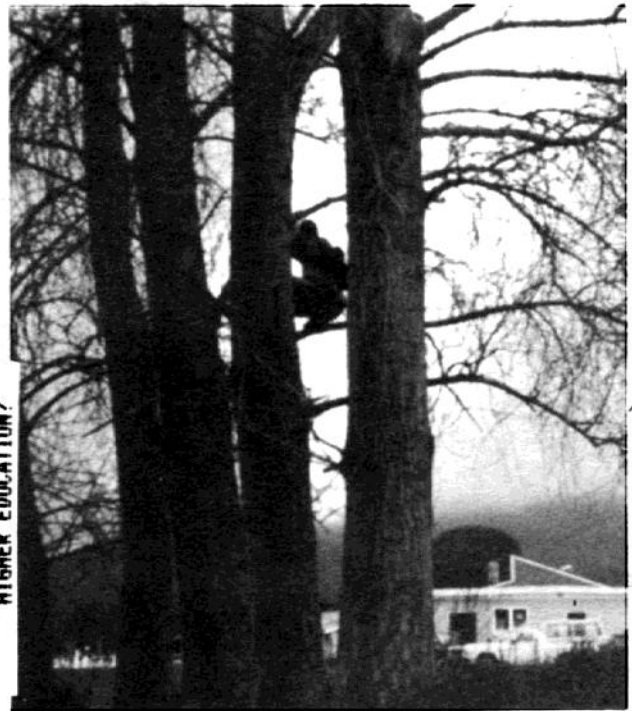
He'd slide to the racks and lock up

ANTIPODEAN IN GERMANY

Late last year I received news from Munich that I had been selected to take part in an intensive six-week study programme for teacher of German. I would join four other New Zealanders, four South Africans and fifteen Australians for the course. All expenses were paid by the Goethe Institute, which promotes Germany and its language throughout the world. I did some negotiating with travel agents and managed to alter my airline tickets to include a night in Los Angeles and New Year with relatives in Holland before the course started on January 5th.

Europe was in the middle of one of its coldest winters ever, and within the first week of the course most of us had bought new, wool-lined shoes to stop toes from freezing on the ever-present snow.

The first three weeks when we stayed in a plush hotel in the heart of Goettingen (about 100km south of Hannover), was the "classroom" phase of the trip - we looked at new German textbooks, new teaching methods, games, songs etc, and had a number of excursions to such varied places as the European Bread Museum, the Volkswagen factory in Wolfsburg

(whose main building is 2.3km long) and a library whose books are up to 1250 years old. We also experienced home visits for the enjoyable and thoroughly fattening German custom of afternoon "Kaffee und Kuchen" (coffee and cakes).

In spite of the cold, I still managed to go for a jog three or four times a week, but the -20°C temperature of one early-morning run was definitely too cold for comfort!

The next phase was a 9-day bus tour of Germany which would have tested anyone's staying power. Early morning breakfasts, travelling by bus, huge lunches of good stodgy German food with the inevitable beer and wine which people in all regions insisted we try, then sightseeing and evening theatre, cinema or pub visits meant that much of the travelling time was spent snoozing (especially on the day when a wine-tasting had been organised for 9.30a.m.)



Phase three was a week in a school of our choice. I attended a comprehensive school in Goettingen, and although there were a number of differences in the German schools and the way they run, my lasting impression of the school was that the pupils were much the same as ours - open, warm and friendly.

The last phase was a week in the divided city of Berlin, world capital of alternative life-styles and graffiti. Berlin seems to have walls everywhere, including the Wall which divides East and West Berlin and which has become covered with graffiti for the whole of its 160km length. On the Western side only, of course. Ironically, the sun shone only on the one day we visited Communist East Berlin.

Throughout the tour of Germany I was constantly struck by the powerful sense of history that the Europeans enjoy. Buildings which are hundreds of years old, cathedrals bigger than a football field and built to last for centuries more, and houses that have had generation upon generation of the same family living it them, all combined to make me feel very humble as a New Zealander.

After Berlin I returned to Holland then London before returning to the Continent. I went north first, to Denmark, Sweden and Norway. I went to the Norwegian extremities of Bergen and Narvik, and a big thrill in Sweden was running across a frozen lake near Gothenburg, where John Walker ran the world's first sub-3.50 mile.

I then travelled back to Germany, Holland, Belgium, Luxemburg, France, Austria and Switzerland. I had intended to visit Spain, Italy and Greece as well, but I ran out of time. I thoroughly enjoyed France, especially Paris. Some of the French rugby fans I met in the South of France saw my Rugby Referees jersey and insisted on discussing the forth-coming World Cup at length.

I am grateful to the Board of Governors for allowing me to take leave during Term 1, and I wish to thank the Goethe Institute for the help they give to teachers in New Zealand and for providing these scholarships which give teachers of German a fabulous opportunity to see the country they teach about.

On the other hand, it was good to be back home after 20 weeks away.

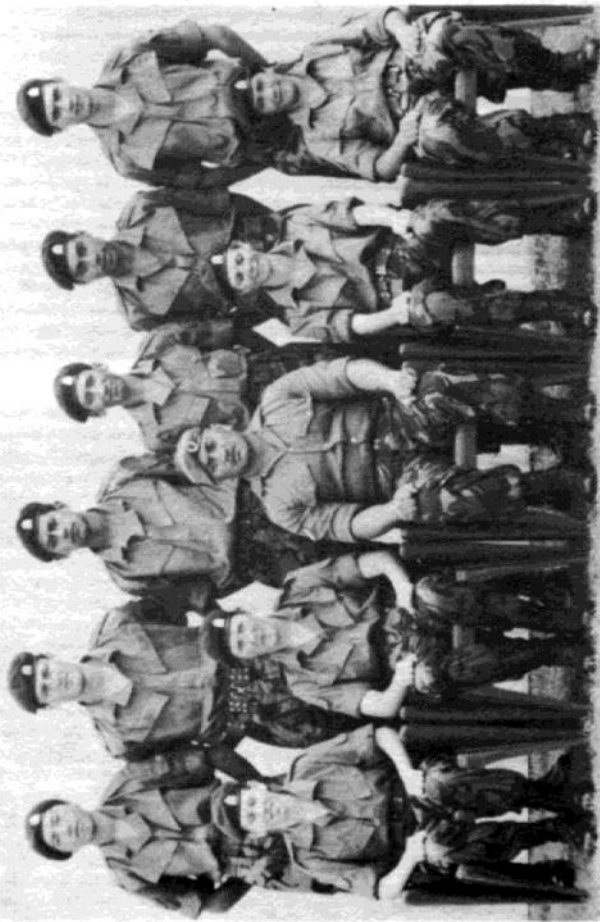
Congratulations to our officers and cadet N.C.O.'s.

DAILY CHORES



SPIRIT OF ADVENTURE

My voyage on the Spirit of Adventure, 20 - 30 October, 1987 began at Marsden Wharf on the Waitemata Harbour, visiting Waiheke Island, the Coromandel Coast, Great Barrier Island and Kawau Island, before returning to Auckland.

The Spirit of Adventure itself is a 32 metre long schooner, accommodating 25 trainees, 8 officers and 1 voyage leader.

All trainees are assigned to a watch, either Starboard A or B, Part A or B, each alternating at the four sail stations - fore, mid, aft and specials - contributing to all aspects of running the ship. The first three sail stations involve setting up and manning sails while sailing, where specials set up meals, man-overboard watch and navigate; all stations are rotated daily.

Routine was virtually the same each day.

* Wake-up at 5.45a.m., get your togs on and go up on deck for 5 minutes. P.T. (physical training), then its overboard for a aswim cold enough to wake the dead.

* Breakfast was at approximately 6.30a.m. - that's cereal followed by a hot meal (usually baked beans or sweetcorn)

* After breakfast was clean-up. Depending on which sail station you were on, jobs were either scrubbing decks, preparing vegetables, washing dishes or cleaning the heads.

* At 8.00a.m. we had colours, which was the raising of the N.Z. Flag and a debriefing of the days programme.

* 8.30a.m. - 12.30p.m. we either sailed, motored somewhere or had lectures, followed by lunch at around 12.30p.m. and was usually big one day and small the next.

* After lunch we either sailed, had lectures, slept, sunbathed or had activities.

* Dinner was around 6.00p.m. - 7.00p.m., followed by a discussion of the day and sometimes followed by activities.

* Lights out was around 9.00p.m. - 10.00p.m.

Many good things came from this trip. As trainees we chose where we wanted to sail. The Captain would suggest to us the best places to go and we would make the final decision. Trainees came from all over the country, and we all got on quite well, though some had strange habits, hardly bothering anyone.

Our voyage passed without anyone throwing up, much to the dismay of the officers. It had its fair share of upsets though. One trainee lost a broom overboard and the next day he threw some cabbage leaves overboard, but they float, not sink, so he had to go and rescue them. We had a man-over-board drill on the eighth day - it took us 30 minutes to rescue the danbouy.

The climax of the voyage was climbing Mt. Moehau, the highest point on the Coromandel Peninsula. The purpose of this was for our own enjoyment, taking 8 hours on navigating through peat and mud, and to locate a transmitter. We came to what we thought was the top. It wasn't so we tried another peak and another and another, until we found the trig.

Overall I feel the voyage was worth going on and I would encourage anyone else to go on it if they were offered the choice.

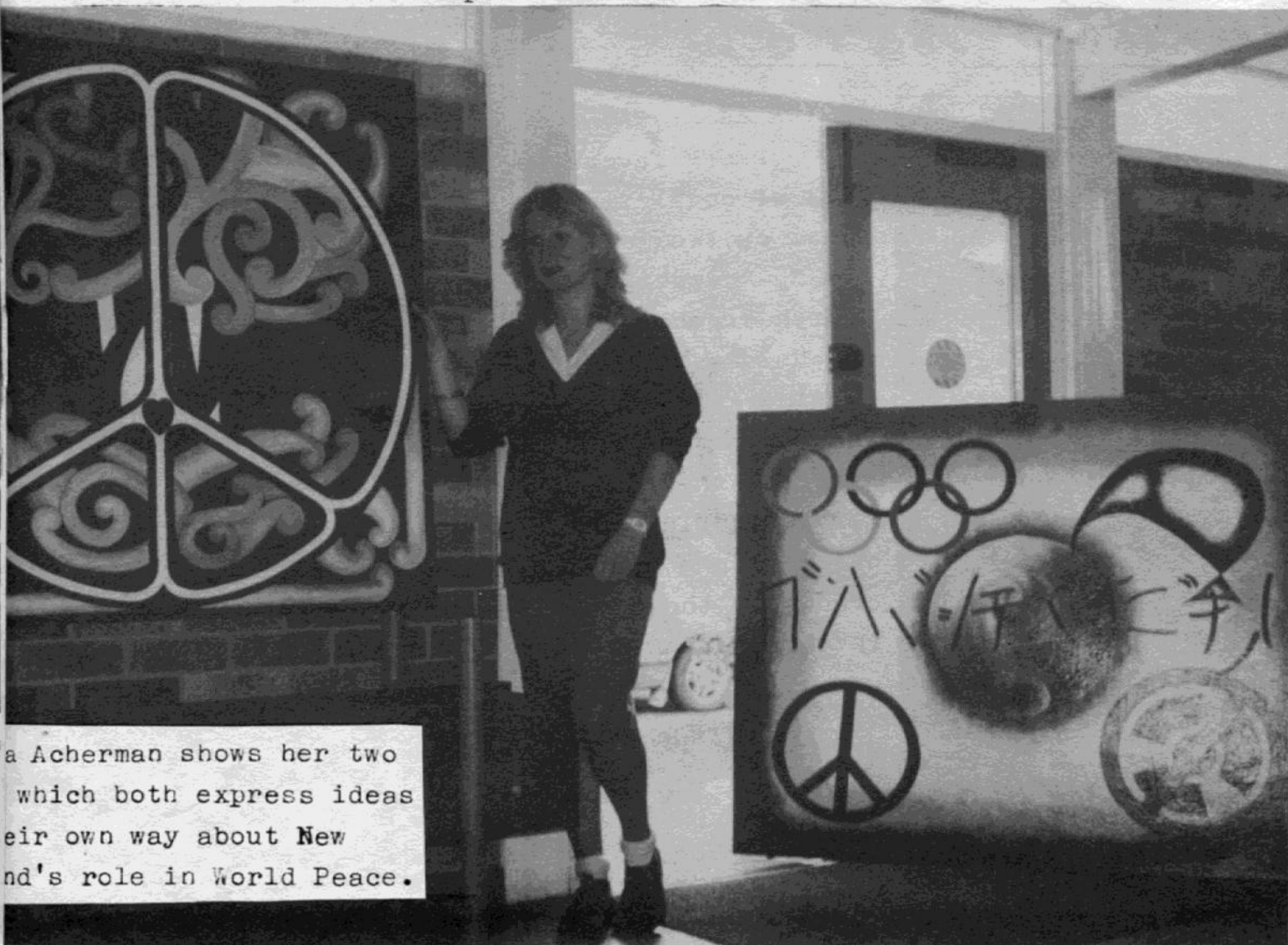

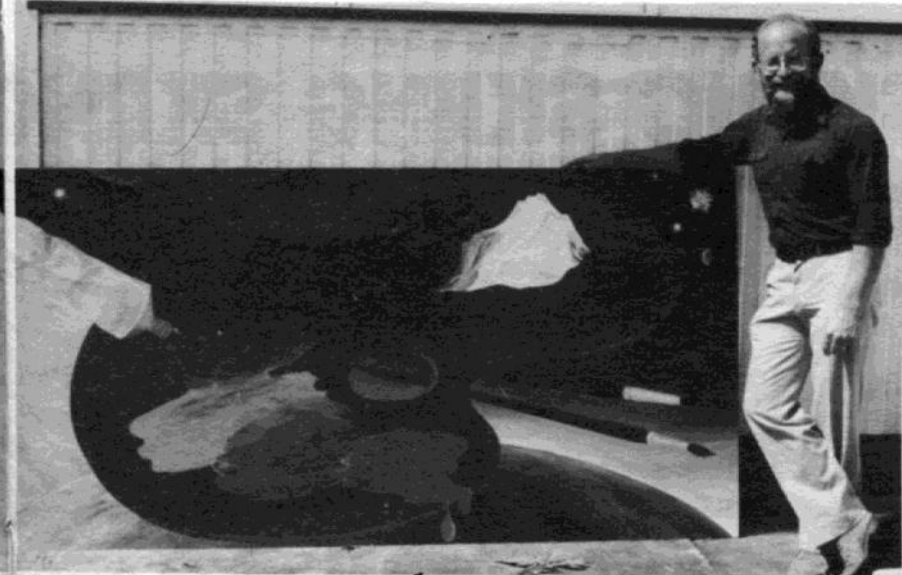

Parents supported us well in both transport and encouragement and a special thanks to our Coach Mrs Denny for taking the time to coach, encourage and support us every Saturday.

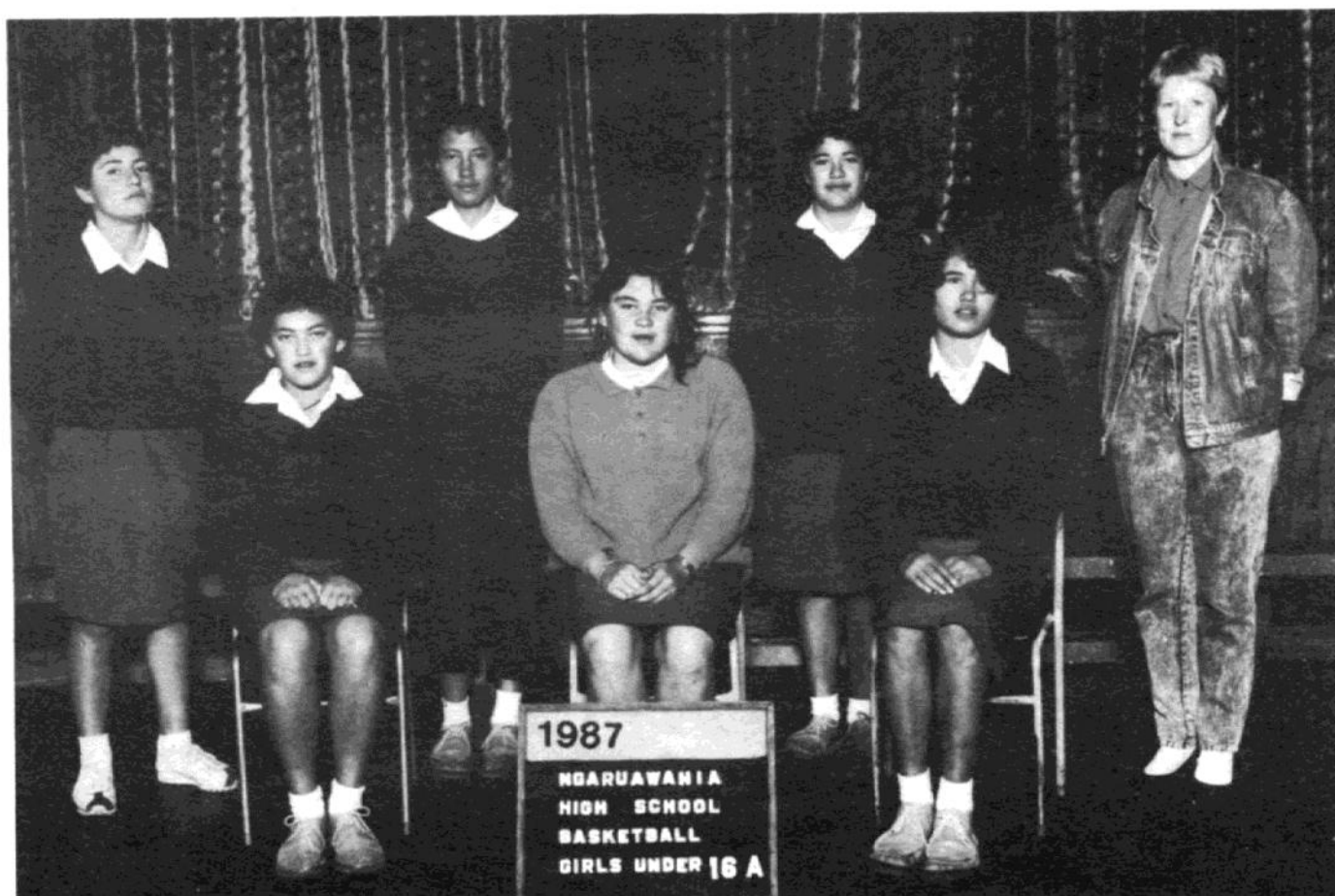
