






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#### **BOARD OF TRUSTEES**



1990 was heralded as being a special year in the history of Aotearoa. A year of historical sgnificance and celebration for our country.

The pagentry, frendliness and sporting competition of the Commonwealth Games in Auckland saw the year off to a spectacular start.

Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II visited our shores and took part in the annual celebrations at Waitangi in early February. Since then throughout the country has been a host of events conducted by the 1990 Commission celebrating this year.

In our school we have several reasons to celebrate the achievements of our students. It is impossible to record everything of significance but I would like to highlight a few events to give a picture of this year.

Our School Certificate results from last year were very good, the best for at least five years and it was pleasing to read these early in the year.

Annual events such as Swimming and Athletic Sports, the School Gala and Workday have been successful this year with more student participation and therefore more enjoyment for all involved.

Earlier this year the final version of our School Charter was signed and accepted by the Ministry of Education. Ours was the first secondary school in the Waikato to be accepted.

Another first was the inagural cultural exchange with Hillcrest High School and again this was a very successful event.

The school production of 'Nightshriek' was a highlight of the school year. It was a 'total' school production with staff, students and parents involved.

The School Ball was once again well organised as the 'social' highlight of the year.

We were represented overseas by Mr Turner and Taniwharau Muru crewing the Waka Tau at the Henley Regatta in London.

For the first time we held a Biathlon in the school and hopefully this will become a regular event on our school calender.

Ailsa McLean left us to travel to Brisbane for a liver transplant and it was great to welcome her back to school in the third term. It is amazing how well she has settled back into the school.

There have been many other highlights but lack of space prevents me from mentioning them all.

Suffice is to say that 1990 has been another successful year for our school and it is great to be able to look back on some of the successes.

My thanks to you all for your contributions. Our school is what we make it, students, staff and parents and I think this year we can be proud of what we have produced.

To those of you who are leaving my best wishes for the future. Remember you will always be part of the school so come and visit us in the future.

To those returning have a good holiday and come back rejuvenated.

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


#### DEPUTY HEAD BOY BRADLEY BOTTING


#### TE WHARE KAI



We are planning to move towards more bilingual teaching in our third form whanau of 1991 - with their Maori, Social Studies and Mathematics being taught in Reo Maori. This will be supported by intensive language teaching in the early part of the year, enabling our whanau members to become more competent in Te Reo Maori. This move towards bilingualism is challenging but very necessary, as we have to meet the needs of increasing numbers of students who have a strong commitment to an understanding of Te Reo Maori.


Although slightly daunted on our return home when one of the buses got a puncture overall it was an enjoyable and overwhelming day out.


To venture into the grounds of where the Treaty of Waitangi was signed gives one a whole different perspective of how the event actually took place rather than reading it from a few sheets of important information.



10 years ago few pakeha knew little about the Treaty of Waitangi. TODAY the treaty is part of our consciousness. The treaty leads us from our past into our future. 1990 is the 150th Anniversary of the signing of the Treaty of Waitangi. It is the YEAR to take the treaty and PUT IT INTO ACTION. What does the Treaty say? The treaty CLEARLY spells out in three short articles how Maori's were WILLING to SHARE this country with those who want to settle here. In the treaty, the crown PROMISED to guarantee and ACTIVELY PROTECT maori absolute authority \*TINO RANGATIRATANGA\* over maori systems, possessions and resources. In return the crown was given the right to govern, the right to peaceful immigration and the right to purchase land for settlement at a fair price. The Maori have tried everything since the treaty was signed to have it HONOURED but the crown has NEVER upheld it's side of the bargain. Successive New Zealand Governments mainly through the use of laws have TAKEN maori land, have IMPOSED their systems based on British law and have UNDERMINED the practices of Maori Law, Religion, Education, Health. Language and other aspects of our culture.

I am Maori and I am PROUD to be a Maori. I don't care what anyone says about me but when my race is involved I feel hurt because of the bitterness of two cultures who are supposed to be as one people.

Process of Definition is an important part of all New Zealanders life because people may sometimes classify you in a bad way. If a Maori rapes a woman, the write-up in the newspaper may say 'Maori Rapes Innocent Woman'. But when a pakeha rapes a woman the write-up in the newspapers may say 'Hamilton Man Rapes Woman'. International scenes catch a persons eye a lot faster and it may turn out a lot worse.

Kelly Everndon is part-maori and his tennis idol was John McEnroe. Kelly Everndon played in a big tournament like the Australian Ford Open and threw his racket down like John does when the umpire makes a bad decision. The newspaper headlines were 'Maori Throws Tantrum'. Two years later Kelly Everndon won a Scholarship to America. The newspaper headlines were 'Part-Maori Wins Scholarship'. Three years later Kelly Everndon won a big tournament in Spain. The Newspaper headlines were 'New Zealander Wins Big Tennis Match'. That was true.

The point that I am trying to make is that the Maori have not been recognised for the pain and loss of damage the crown has caused through these 150 years. If the treaty could be honoured the way it was SUPPOSED to there would be less conflict amoung all New Zealanders. We all belong to this country now even though we do not come from the same backgrounds. Because pakeha have become the majority we tend to see our way of doing things the RIGHT and PROPER way - others see it differently.

We all call for the help of our pakeha friends to help us in our strife to get back what RIGHTFULLY belongs to us. You may see it differently and I am not blaming you for the crowns dishonesty. All I am asking is that we fight this struggle TOGETHER AS ONE PEOPLE.

Four O'clock - Monday 23rd April - PANIC!!

Mum! Mum! My beepers gone off!! I was shaking, scared and I said to myself "What happens now?" Mum rang the hospital. Then we drove there and we had green lights all the way, I wished we had red.

We got to the hospital and went to ward RTU (Renal Transplant Unit). I had a shower and in my panic I fell over and bruised my knee.

The drip they gave half-pie knocked me out, vet calmed me down. Then there was a stream of doctors, one after the other. My operation was scheduled for 11:30, I didn't care, I was out.

Up till that day I was visiting the hospital once, maybe twice a week. During that time I was taking up to 10 pills a day.

I stayed in hospital for the first 10 days. During that time they took blood tests after blood tests. At one time they took 15 tubes of blood, I was wondering if they were going to leave enough for me.

I met Jilly-Anne Gilmore who was a patient support person. She also had a liver transplant 4 years ago, talking to her made me feel really good because she gave me lots of confidence that the operation would be successful. What a wonderful help that was.

To fill in time before the operation we went shopping,

shopping and more shopping - anything to keep my mind occupied even though we bought very little.

The operation took eleven hours and I was kept under sedation for about 24 hours. remember anything until the Wednesday when Mum and Dad came to visit. I couldn't talk because I was on a respirator which meant I had a tube down my throat, to my lungs. It helped me breathe, which was horrible, but necessary.

I was sore all over, there were lots of tubes and drips on every part of me. Everyday either a drain or a drip was removed. I was in intensive care for about three and a half days then came down to RTU on the Friday and I was in hospital for a total of three weeks.

Even though I was discharged, I still had to visit the hospital every morning to have a blood test then wait for the results. After two weeks of this, it was reduced to once a week. I still had one tube to be removed, which was taken out 2 weeks before I came home.

I feel really glad to be home now, and I know that it would not have been possible without the help and support of everyone concerned.

# HILLCREST CULTURAL EXCHANGE

For the first time Ngaruawahia High School and Hillcrest High School combined for a day of cultural exchange. This proved to be a very successful, informative and enjoyable experience for both schools. Activities included Debating, Chess, Kapahaka Practice and a combined performance, Drama workshops, Music workshops and a combined Big Band performance, Dance, Speeches and Japanese Language and Cultural activities. The following is a report on the day by Jacinda McLennan and Loretta Pennington of Hillcrest High School.

#### A PERSPECTIVE

Early in the century it was believed that the Maori Culture was virtually extinct. However, in the latter half of the twentieth century great advances have been made towards recovery. This was shown through the recent Hillcrest High School and Ngaruawahia High School cultural exchange. This was the first time that such an exchange had taken place and organisational tips for next time were acquired. Overall, April 27 was a successful and enlightening experience for many of the students of Hillcresrt High School. The great part that the Maori Culture plays in the education of todays students at Ngaruawahia High School was both encouraging and surprising. The knowledge of Maori culture shown by the students of Ngaruawahia was demonstrated

throughout the day by strong welcoming powhiri. For many students of Hillcrest the day was educational. Many had not experienced such a close encounter with the first culture of New Zealand. Others found the visit to be frustrating as they were not aware of the ettiquette used on the marae. More particularly they were unaccustomed to the frequently spoken Maori language. How is it that so many of us have come so far into our final years of public schooling and yet we have so little contact with our nations culture and therefore remain ignorant to one of our countries finest assets? If nothing else the 1990 cultural exchange between Hillcrest and Ngaruawahia has played a significant part in helping many of Hillcrest's students to understand some of the difficulties we face today as a nation. Such close contact has shown us that in order to unite we first must understand thoroughly the perspective of the other significant race in our country. We have learn't that we must be tolerant of individual diversity while encouraging national unity. Ours is a society where different racial groups retain their distinct culture while making creative use of others and for this reason we strongly recommend the continuation of the exchange between Hillcrest and Ngaruawahia.





Mornings were started off by the typical 6am jump overboard which was the only nearest thing to a bath.
















## PANSITION EDUCATION

In March, four sixth formers attended a Waikato Language Camp at CYC. Ngaruawahia. They were Kerryn-Ruth Botting, Michelle Keast, Nicola Pellew and Brent Singers, along with our Japanese Exchange Student Keiko Azumi. Keiko decided to take Maori language at camp. All the students gained a lot of confidence from this experience.

In April fifth and sixth formers hosted guests from

Hillcrest High School for Tea and Games as well as contributing towards a very interesting display of things Japanese.

In July the fourth formers enjoyed a Sukiyaki Dinner and many are now adept in the art of eating with

chopsticks.

In August, classmates of Ailsa McLean decided to make 1000 Origami Cranes and posted them to Ailsa in Brisbane. 1000 Origami Cranes represent prayers for recovery from illness and a long life.

#### TRIP TO JAPAN

On 20 June 1990, I left NZ with 7 other NZ'ers and went to Japan for Five-and-a-Half weeks. It was my first time overseas so I was excited as well as nervous. It was a 10 hour flight and when we arrived, we stayed in Tokyo for 2 days on an Orientation Camp. There were 120 students from America, Australia and 4 other Asian countries. At the Orientation we learned a bit of Japanese Language and Culture.

On the 3rd day, everyone went seperate ways to their host family for the rest of the 5 weeks. I had a four hour journey to Ogasa, a small town with a population of 13,000. The town was very traditional, maintaining old customs and way of life.

In my host family, I had a Mother, Father, Brother, 17; Sister, 16. I was lucky enough to get a family who were kind and helpful. My family were traditional, so I slept on a Futon and used a Japanese style Bath and Toilet.

I went to Kakegawa-West High School for three weeks. School is very different from NZ. I went to school Monday to Friday and Half a day on Saturday. There were 6 periods a day, 4 in the morning and 2 after lunch. No Interval! So I was always starving by lunchtime. After the 6th period, we had form-rooms then cleaning. All the students clean the school; sweeping, dusting etc. My school was 4 stories high with 1300 students. In each class were 48 students. For most classes the teachers would change class but for some the students would change. My school had tennis courts, a baseball field, soccer field and a running track, but there was no grass, only dirt, so when it rained it was total mud. Also they had a massive swimming pool.

While I was in Japan the hottest it got in my area was 40 degrees! The uniform for girls were a long black skirt, a white shirt and shoes and socks. So when it was 40 degrees, it was very hot, humid and sticky.

To Japanese students, school clubs are their social life. Everybody belongs to a club and some clubs meet everyday for a few hours. I had a week off school, so my host mother took me on a tour for 3 days. The first day, I went on a bus tour of Hakone, Mt Fuji. The next 2 days, I went to Tokyo. Tokyo is an amazing place. It's always busy with lots of people

and there are so many tall buildings. The 2nd day I went to Disneyland, Unfortunately it was raining but I still had a good time. The next day I went to the Imperial Palace, Tokyo Tower and Hard Rock Cafe which is really cool! Also, I went to a rush hour at the train station and watched the 'pushers' shove the people into the trains, It was unbelievable!

I went to a few festivals and many other places in

Japan. I had a great time!

This opportunity to travel overseas as an exchange student only came up through an A.F.S. exchange programme. If you are interested in going overseas for two months or a year, I suggest you apply to A.F.S. You don't have to be brainy or rich, they judge you by your personality. I was fortunate to get a scholarship (where they pay part or all of your trip). So go for it. It's an experience of a lifetime.

Hello, my name is Keiko Azumi. I came from Japan in January 1990. I live in Huntly. At first, I was very surprised at many hills, animals, and that boys wear shorts to school! In Japan, we wear uniform but its quite different. All boys wear long black trousers and girls wear long skirts, even in summer. So, if you went to Japan and wore shorts in a city, everyone would look at you and laugh. (boys)

Everything is different, but food is very different. We usually eat rice and many fishes, because fishes are cheaper and healthy than meat. And we eat lots of vegetables. Of course we eat lots of rice cooked in different ways but, we don't eat rice pudding. I hate it! I had never eaten it in Japan. Oh Yuck! But other puddings

are nice. So I will be fat.

I like this school much better than Japanese one. We must go to school six days a week and after school we go home with so much homeworks. Schools students can't sleep before 12 or 1 o'clock cause of homeworks and some students go to bed at about 4am. Even on Sunday, many students go to cramming school. I hate it. I love here and you!


#### MOT TRAFFIC SURVEY












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
