


The year got off to a great start with our *live in*. We slept in the marae and had a great time playing soccer and watching videos. It was a great way for the juniors to get to know the seniors.


Hello!

As I do I see her distinct features Her clear white skin Long brown hair And her wide blue eyes


I tell her my plight And of my tormentors I ask for her to stop them To end my pain


THE MAN OF X.

With the experience from last year, along with some new faces, we set out down the tough road that lay ahead.




The season was a good one for the boys' touch team. We lost only two games in the Secondary School competition which helped us qualify for the Regionals held at Church College.






It was an enjoyable day, students got to be managers, worked in group situations, met new people, learnt about business, used their imagination and were able to see the practical use of it.

All in all the trip was fun, maybe challenging as well.


