The Education Review Office Report

ERO is an independent, external evaluation agency that undertakes rigorous reviews of schools and early childhood services throughout New Zealand.

Our school can be justifiably proud of the report published by the agency.

I will read some extracts from the report.

Extract One 'The quality of teaching continues to be a major focus for whole school professional development. The school believes that quality interactions between teacher and student are paramount to effective teaching.'

Extract Two 'Most students are actively engaged in meaningful learning in a climate of mutual respect'

Outstanding practice from staff in these areas considerably enhances the quality of these programmes. Teachers are deeply committed to providing the best possible learning experiences for students'.

Extract Seven 'The emotional wellbeing of students is paramount. A holistic approach to student care and guidance reflects the value the school places on the individual and the belief that all students can learn'.

These aren't my words. They are the words of the governments watch dog. These extracts affirm how our vision is being acted on. However it must be acknowledged that we still have a long, long journey ahead of us.

The second area I would like to touch upon is that of student achievement.

When management reflected a couple of weeks ago on the many successes our students had achieved, Mr Jones made the comment that we 'Fight well above our weight.' He's absolutely right we do. For such a small school we have indeed achieved many successes across a wide spectrum.

Academic Successes

Our 2002 Bursary results were very pleasing. One scholarship and two attempts 1% short of scholarships. All students sitting Bursary Economics, Bursary Art and Bursary Maori passed. Under NZQA definition of passes we achieved a 100% pass rate! At NCEA Level One Panekuhukuhu Muru was ranked ninth in New Zealand amassing an incredible 210 credits on the Framework. Gareth Dean winning a David Johnstone Memorial Scholarship for Science and receiving a special award for achievement in Correspondence Chemistry from the New Zealand Correspondence School.







I am 17 years old and I'm doing 6th form at the moment


and then 7th form till June when I'm going back home to Germany and do two more years at school...







wanted revenge and after the match they were placed 3rd and NHS 4th. Not enough to get to Nationals but it was okay, we had a Primo time.




We faced CCNZ in the semis, but lost. So instead we played for third and fourth against Hillcrest High School and won!!



Many skills and heaps of knowledge were' gained from this real business experience and we are all grateful for the opportunity. Anyone else who gets the chance should go for it!




During the first two terms of this year exchange student Jonas Jensen involved himself in the construction of the school's web site, with Nicholas Kerr-Bell as his apprentice.

Jonas has now returned to Denmark and continues with the Webmaster Nicholas responsibilities.


The site is an ongoing creation to be expanded as the years go on. A new section being developed is that of the "Old Students"


