



- ✓ Literacy team targeting Y9 and Y10 literacy


These were the components of our 2010 school strategic plan and will continue to be for 2011 until they become systemic in school practice.


I stood up and stormed out of the bedroom. At the door, I looked back. Hayden sat still as a rock. How could you not remember this? What is wrong with you?

The school is a Decile 10 and has very few Maori students. Barbara later revealed to me that her students thought our pupils looked fabulous in our smart No.1 uniforms and wished


they had uniforms like it. That's something I treasure considering the amount of hassle we have getting them into uniform.

































Waka Ama National Secondary Schools Championships 2010

Thank you to Matua Barney and Mr Lichtwark for sharing your knowledge with us, especially at 6am three mornings


a week. We didn't realize how much more fitter we were until we hit the water.

Thought the trip was long and tiresome, but then it was worth it. They watched the politicians have their say in the debating chamber. There was far too much arguing and their


unstintingly throughout the time when Kirk and his two younger sisters, Anne Marie and Rosemary attended Ngaruawahia High.

Day 1 – Star Lab and Ngā Miro Healthy Eating

The Matariki Celebrations began on Friday 11th June with a touching korero and karakia by Matua Dawson followed by a waiata tautoko by Whaea Tiria that had been learnt earlier in the week about Matariki.

First up on the programme was the Star Lab Planetarium. Here the rangatahi (and Teachers) had to crawl into a huge inflatable tent that resembled an igloo and was pitch black on the inside.

Rangatahi learnt about the constellations in the Southern Night Sky, how we get day and night, the phases of the Moon and most importantly, how to locate the Matariki (Pleiades) cluster of stars

Following this interesting and astounding experience the rangatahi were taken into Ngahia where they were

greeted by Whaea Ku's crew from Nga Miro.

The rangatahi were up for a real treat where they had the opportunity to sample delicious fruit kebabs and smoothies whilst learning about the importance of eating healthily.

We ended the day with a well deserved game of Ki-o-rahi.


Day 6 - Ki-o-rahi Tournament

"I wanted to create something fun for all ages to enjoy – and it intrigued me to try and build a shoot-out game," Alisha said.


"I am very impressed with my final project and hope that one day I can make more of the cowboy shoot out game. I want to make it go global."

Ngaruawahia High School student Jared Solomon helped his Fairfield Swimming Club to a gold medal at the national swimming championships in Auckland earlier this year.

Jared, swimming the third leg in the men's open 4 by 200 club relay, took the lead and his team won, surprising the Auckland opposition.

North Shore, New Zealand's biggest swimming club, has been dominating the championships and was thought to clean up in the club relay.

But the Fairfield team of Jared, twin brothers Andrew and Jonathan Pullon and Murray Pretorius took the lead in the third leg and held on to win gold ahead of North Shore and Waves from Otago, a club which dedicates itself to only competitive swim programmes.

"This is a big deal for Fairfield," says team captain Andrew Pullon.

"We're just a little club but we were really pumped for this race, gave it everything, and Jared, who swam the third leg, set us up nicely for the finish."

Their time was 7.48.33 and sets a new national record because it's the first time they've held club relays at the New Zealand Open Championships; previously relays have been regional races only.

Back in the pool later the same group of boys represented their region in the 4 by 100 metres relay and won a bronze medal, knocking three seconds off the old Waikato record with a time of 3.37.49.

We also give thanks to our school for providing us with the transport we needed to get to and from our games.


Now lets all get ready for next year because we are hoping for the outcomes to be twice as good.





You can't see it from here, but I know that an old villa stands at the end of this scruffy-looking lane. The roof is faded red and the windows could use a coat of paint.

Looking at it, it doesn't seem anything special or different from the hundreds of old villas around the country -side.

But it is, and what makes it so is that it is home. And I'm about to take my first step onto the driveway that will take me there.

I unlatch the hook of the gate and it creaks as it opens. The mid-day sun is high overhead and the warm air is thick with all the crazy smells of summer. Pine trees, wild flowers and cow pats fill the air. Shadows play around my feet as they crunch up the gravel path.

Far away everything looks hazy in the heat although a row of pines is lit up as if highlighted by the sun.

In the paddock to my left a mob of sheep run off towards a battered old shed that seems lost in time, slow creeping spider webs smothering it. To one side of it a pile of old bricks lie lifeless. Once set aside to make something useful, they are now forgotten, covered in moss and grime.

Several pigs finish rolling in the mud, grunting at each other before running off to catch the sun as it drifts effortlessly across the sky.

Tall grass on my left reaches to grasp my hand. I look closer and can see the dead bugs left behind with what remains of their homes. Tattered webs blow in the wind, holding on with what little they have left.

I walk down past the swamp, dirty and deserted, untamed and unruly, sitting, waiting. Weeds surround the shallow body of dirty water. Creatures swim amongst the moss and twigs withering away; parasites feasting on anything that dares to enter. The stench of stake air mixes with the cow pat on the ground.

All around can be heard the sweet sounds of summer. Off in the distance birds chirp, bees buzz, pigs grunt and squeal and cows moo. Ahead the clink of the dog's chain as she runs back and forth lets me know it isn't too far now.

Trudging slowly up the drive a car lies abandoned inside a dilapidated shed. Green pain is peeling off it. The wood above is cracked and there are holes from burrowing bugs.

Just opposite, rusted shipping crates standing still, silence surrounding

them both. No movement. No life. Musty smells seeping through a tiny hole near the bottom.

I unlatch a second gate, fighting off the pigs to get safely through. One barks as I quickly shut the gate. It's shrieking cry has an eerie resemblance to the slaughter house not far up the road.

I push on and continue up the drive. The dog attacks me with kisses. I stand and look out to the empty field.

By now the sun has almost gone. From the south a cool wind pushes and pulls at the trees. The sky fades to dullness.

My step quickens. Cars fill up any open space that would otherwise remain atop the hill.

I see shadowy figures up ahead, prancing inside the brightly lit house.
Relief. My journey is almost over.

I follow the sweet smell of roasting pork up the driveway. Dozens of cats greet me as I reach the steps, all purring and rubbing against my leg.

A porch light flicks on to show me the way.

As I reach for the door I pause to take one final glance. Darkness has consumed all.

I kick off my shoes. I'm home.







Recently crowned dux of Ngaruawahia High School, Sarah Michelle-Washer, has been labelled "the spectrum of giftedness and talent" and a true champion for the school.

While she does ooze these qualities they are tempered by a warmth and humbleness that belie her 17 years.

She is quiet too, until you get her talking about the school she will soon leave and her eyes light up. Just don't say anything bad about Ngaruawahia High School in front of her.

" I am 100 per cent behind Ngaruawahia High School," Sarah said.

"There is sometimes a negative attitude towards the school but people don't know what Ngaruawahia High is like. I don't know how people can say negative things when they haven't experienced life here. You need to experience it before you pass judgement and that is the same as anything in life." Sarah almost didn't enrol at Ngaruawahia High. Her original plan was to go to Hamilton Girls High because her family moved out of the area into Hamilton.

But some strong friendships established at Horitiu Primary convinced her otherwise.

"A big draw to Ngaruawahia High was the friends I made at Horitiu Primary.

"But I have never regretted coming to Ngaruawahia High. Not a chance. It has been a vastly different experience than I would have had at Girls High. The high cultural aspect and proximity to Turangawaewae has really opened me up to a whole different world.

"I have grown more of a knowledge and understanding of Maori culture that I never would have had the opportunity to learn anywhere else.

Sarah credits her mentor and the school's principal Robyn Roa with her confidence and success within the school.

"Whaea Roa has been fantastic. She has been a friend and mentor to me. When I first started here I was really shy and she would reassure me whenever I felt out of my depth. She gave me a lot of guidance in cultural matters and really boosted my confidence."

But Mrs Roa said it was Sarah who made the school a good place to be.

"She made it a good place to be herself. Sarah decided this was going to be a successful place for her and it has been.

"From year 9 all the way through, she was determined and bubbly.

"She's the spectrum of giftedness and talent, from art to law, she is the whole lot.

"It has been my absolute pleasure to be her mentor, friend, teacher and principal.

"She has grown immensely. You can't get through here and be a weak person."

Being named Dux is the icing on the cake for Sarah after achieving impressive academic results and establishing a cultural confidence.

"I am over the moon to be named Dux. All these years of hard work have paid off.

"My goal when I first came here was always to become Dux of the school.

"It's a tribute to all the people who have helped me get to this point."

For her hard work she has been gifted three academic scholarships totalling \$ 17,000, which she intends to use to advance her impending studies at Waikato University.

"I am going to Waikato University to study law and business management because I want to own my own business.

"I like the idea of controlling a business's direction and sorting out a strategy to take it forward."

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

Year 12 three-day Business Enterprise course

On Wednesday, 17th, Thursday 18th and Friday 19th February 2010 our Year 12 students along with senior students from Rakaumaunga attended the 3 day business programme which was being hosted by our school. This programme is sponsored by the Maori Women's Development Incorporated who are the key sponsors of this programme.

Kaipakihi Ranga Wairua or Inspired Entrepreneur Experience is a business simulation event for Year 12 students introducing 'building blocks' of successful business.

Students will utilise skills gained from all their subjects while gaining new essential skills like the creation of the business plan, negotiating, leadership and teamwork (from a business prospective), delegation, time management, and many other areas.

Students were put into 8 teams. Each team brainstorms a business idea, choose a leader and attend workshops run by facilitators to provide them with information needed to turn their business idea into a viable business concept. There are workshops on leadership, strategic planning, Production, marketing, finance and SWOT analysis.

On the final day the teams put together an 'expo style' stand to promote their business idea to guest judges, aiming to be the team that wins the award for entrepreneurial excellence. All students who attend the full three day programme receive certificates and badges and the winning team members receive a medal each.

Forty-two years wiser...

February
3rd 1969 saw a
young 23-yearold primary
school teacher
join the staff at
Ngaruawahia
High.

The Board of Governors and the Principal, Mr

E B Allison, were then seeking primary-trained teachers to make timetabling of school subjects more flexible.

In those early years secondary teachers were generally educated to teach only within their specialty and there was a need for general primary-trained class-room teachers who could work in any department.

Sandy MacDonald, after previously teaching in primary schools for four years undertook classes in English, Science, Phys'ed, Social Studies and Mathematics.

As the years progressed he was asked to move into such subject areas as Technical Drawing, Woodwork, Engineering and Craft as well as a brief dabble in Typing (using manual typewriters) and Art.

Once the school had invested in a suite of Commodore computers he moved into that area also with HOD Computing Joan Myles.

Over the ensuing years the number of PC computers grew as they became more affordable, until today when school boasts six computer suites. In 2000, with the retirement of Joan Myles, Sandy "defaulted" into the position of HOD Computing.

He involved himself also in School Newsletter and Yearbook production, the school photographer, Kapa Haka Tour recorder (touring USA & Hawaii) and assisting the staff in computer matters.

Over the 42 years at school he has taken only eight days of sick-leave!

"Mr Mac" is proud to have seen his five children progress through the school (ex-Waipa pupils) and move on into successful futures.

His two sons, Regan and Andre, moved from Waikato University to work in Sydney for Reebok International as successful senior IT administrators.

Daughters Yvette joined the Public Relations Department of Manukau City Council, Jacinda enrolled and trained as an Army Medical Officer and Janferay became an Administrator with True Alliance Ltd. They have, along with countless others from NHS, disproved the misconception that you need to attend a "city school" to become successful. His three daughters are now full-time mothers. Sandy has to consider Christmas and Birthday gifts for 10.5 grand-children!


Although very proud of all his children have done (and will do), one of the numerous highlights occurred in 2000 when his daughter Jacinda was awarded by the Governor General the 'New Zealand Order of Merit' for action under fire in East Timor in 1999 when providing emergency treatment in the middle of a fire-fight for wounded Australian soldiers. Her commendation was recommended by the Australian Armed Forces Commander.

He sees his greatest success observing his children raise their families in a secure environment with love, time, concern and high behavioural expectations and social standards.

At the full school farewell on Friday 5th November, he was presented with two paintings from the Year 11 and Year 12 classes (below) along with a koru statuette and a large quantity of wrapped sweets (and did we notice a tear or two?). A large number of the students performed a waiata and then a hall-shaking haka.

In his farewell talk he spoke of those past-pupils from the school who had become successes in their fields. Also mentioned were the two Kapa Haka tours to USA (1998) and Hawaii (2005) and other highlights in the school's life (see following pages). Also observed was the fact that one-third of the current staff are past-pupils of the school!


